

Housing shortage affects teachers

At the September meeting of Milton Separate School Board last week, trustees learned one new teacher was travelling to Milton daily from Toronto. The married teacher, her husband and two children had been unable to find suitable accommodation in town after making concerted efforts to do so. A trustee indicated the teacher applied for an apartment in an apartment building, but was refused because she had two children. "I think its' discrimination," he charged.

Trustee Angelo Tonelli noted it was just another indication of the "drastic shortage of homes and apartments in town."

An invitation was received from the Rotary Club of Milton to attend a special dinner meeting where W. J. Clarke, the Administrator for the Special Schools and Services Branch of the Department will be the guest speaker. Secretary-treasurer R. W. Clarke was instructed to enquire to see how many board members and teachers wished to attend.

The secretary-treasurer reported a new teacher, Mrs. Mary Dumas, formerly of Nova Scotia, began teaching Monday. He also reported all Catholic teachers employed by the board have agreed to attend a special "catechetical seminar." As of last week, there were 562 children registered at the school.

The secretary-treasurer was instructed to send a letter of thanks to Milton Hydro for providing a stove and refrigerator for home economics purposes.

Mr. Tonelli inquired about the parish hall and wondered when it might be ready for use as a school gymnasium. The board's vice-chairman Rev. Father J. J. Murphy was delegated to look into the costs of equipping the hall for basketball and other sports such as badminton.

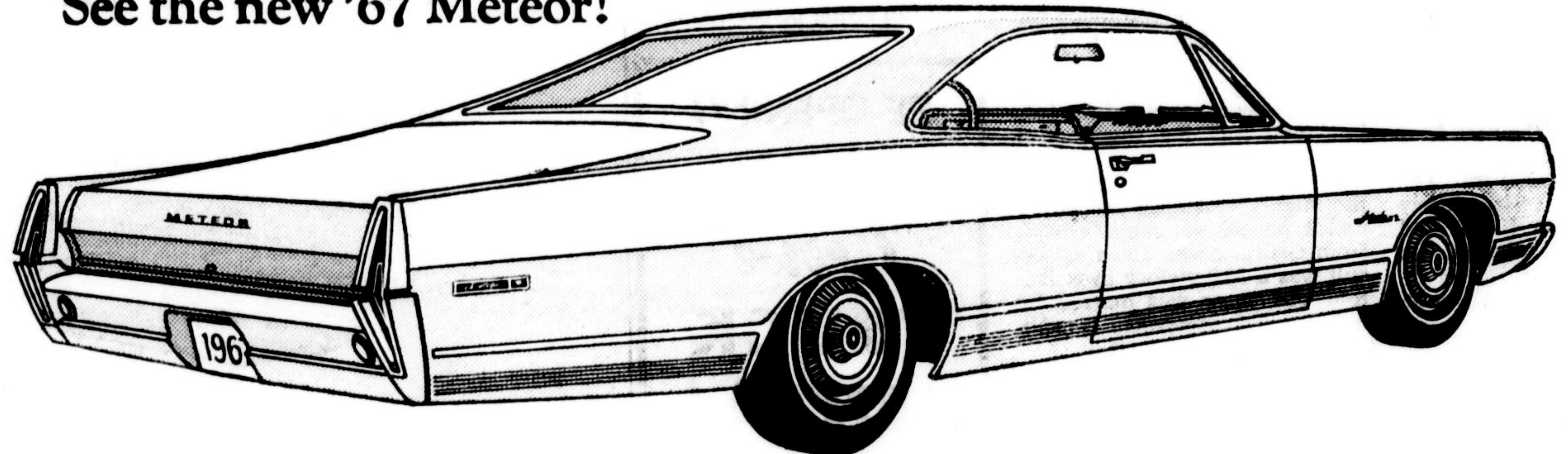
