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Oakville V.O.N. names New Zealand nurse

The Board of Directors, Victorian Order of Nurses, Oakville Branch this week announced the appointment of Miss Margaret Peattie as Nurse-in-Charge. Miss Peattie comes from New Zealand and took her nurses' training there before going to Western University, London, Ontario, where she completed the course in Public Health Nursing.

She worked for the Victorian Order of Nurses in London for one year and then returned to New Zealand and continued her work here with the Order. She has been getting acquainted with the Oakville Branch during the past couple of months and as of September 1, took over her full responsibilities.

Last year the Oakville Branch of the V.O.N. made 4,652 visits to 375 patients in the Milton-Oakville area. During the first eight months of 1966 these totals have been increased considerably.

The V.O.N. provides professional nursing care in the home which includes injections, dressings, bathing and general bedside nursing. At the patient's request counsel is given before and after the birth of the baby. The patient's doctor is always

contacted before any service is given. The fees charged by the V.O.N. are adjusted to suit the individual financial circumstances of the family, and some types of insurance covering home nursing care.

er, Mr. Denby of the Guelph Bell Telephone, showed a film and spoke on the History and Development of the Sun.

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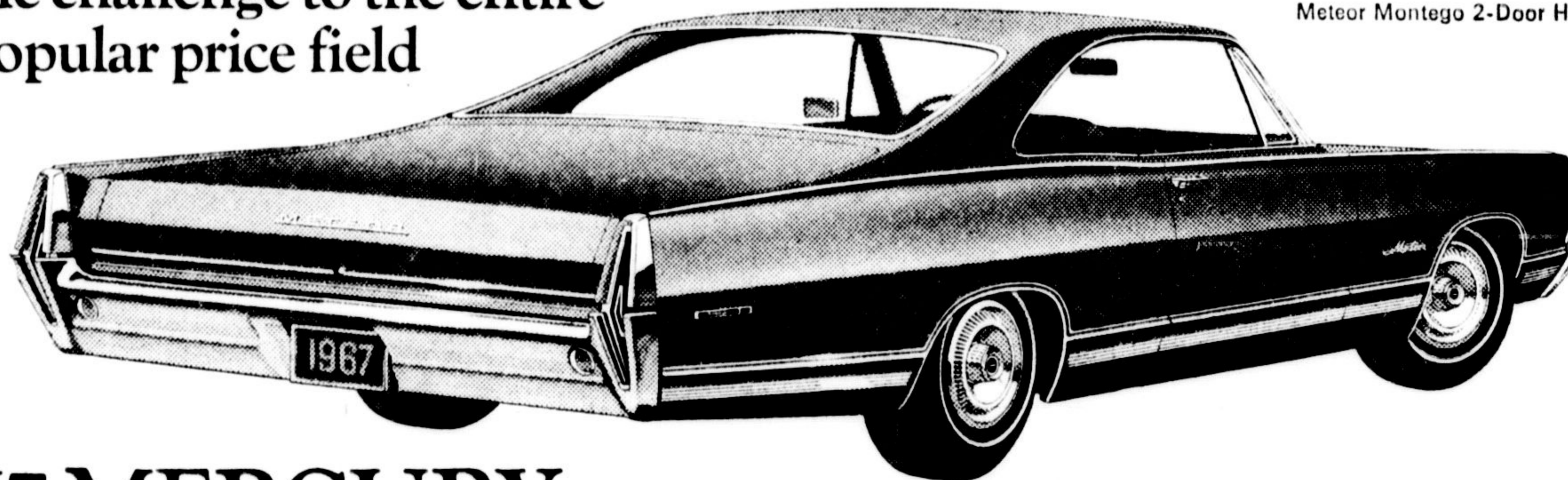
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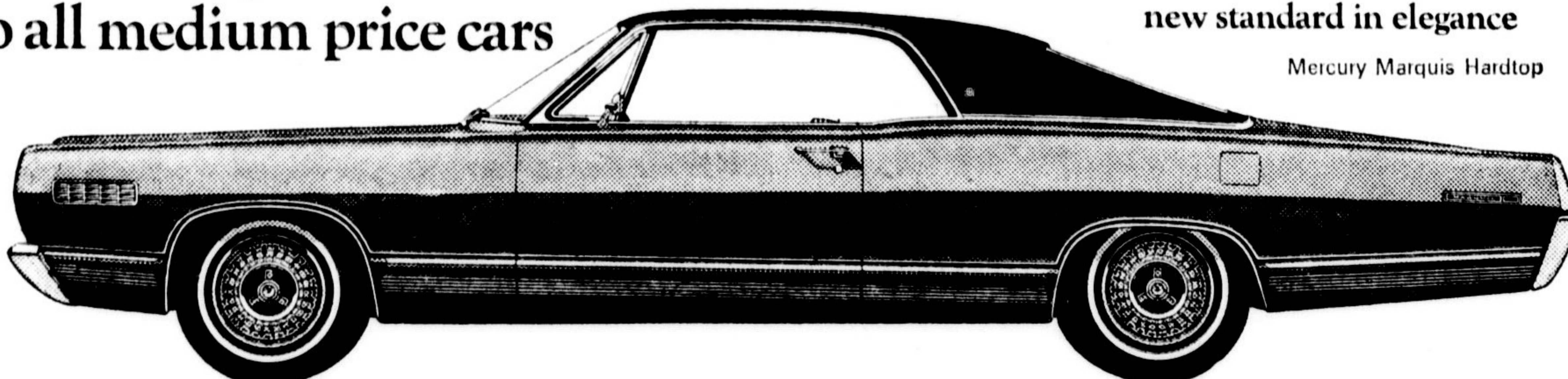
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
