

Large children's exhibit at fair

Judges had difficulty choosing winners in the children's work competitions at Milton Fair on the weekend.

Some classes had such heavy entries, they awarded double prizes or extra prizes. Printing and writing classes saw 24 to 36 entries each, art classes had up to 32 entries, science contests had as many as 14 entries and as many as 23 entered the social studies divisions.
