Although being in the month of September is no guarantee of longevity, four Milton district residents who celebrate "over 90" birthdays this month might tend to feel that way.

The four—W. J. "Bill" Hampshire who is 94 today (Sept. 28), Charles Featherstone who was 93 on September 21, Miss E. Jane McPhail who will celebrate her 92nd on Sept. 28, and Robert Rasberry who was 91 on Sept. 15—have combined ages totalling 370 years.

Despite the usual physical setbacks that occur with old age, all four are still in relatively good health and able to be up and around to celebrate their birthdays. After 90, they're important occasions.

Mr. Hampshire, formerly a Speyside area man, has lived recently at the Kelly Nursing Home on the outskirts of Acton. "Doing a good hard day's work" is his only recipe for longevity, and he feels smoking is no drawback since he's smoked since he was 16 and still enjoys a pipe.

He is a former Halton County sheriff, school trustee, active church worker, Federal election candidate, county councillor, amateur boxer and noted public speaker. Born in Fergus, he came to Speyside as a baby and spent the remainder of his life there.

Charles Featherstone, who lives just south of Milton on Highway 25, was a thresher in this district for over 30 years, and once threshed clover in Burlington where Brant St. now stands.

to Alberta and eventually went to Calgary. She spent 20 of her 40 years of teaching at a Calgary High School.

In 1937 she retired and returned to Campbellville. She has vivid memories of Calgary's growth from a town of 5,000 to a bustling city.

Mr. Rasberry celebrated his 91st birthday quietly, at the home of his son Russell at Cedar Springs where he has been living recently. He was born in Kilbride and farmed there until 36 years ago, when he and

his wife moved to Milton where she operated a nursing home. After his wife's death a year ago he returned to Kilbride area to live with his son.

Among his memories are the days when his father drove the daily stage to Hamilton, and also ran the Kilbride hotel. Mr. Rasberry remembers getting up at 2.30 a.m. for the two and a half hour trip to market in Hamilton—via horse and buggy. In 1911 he had the distinction of purchasing the first car in the village of Kilbride.

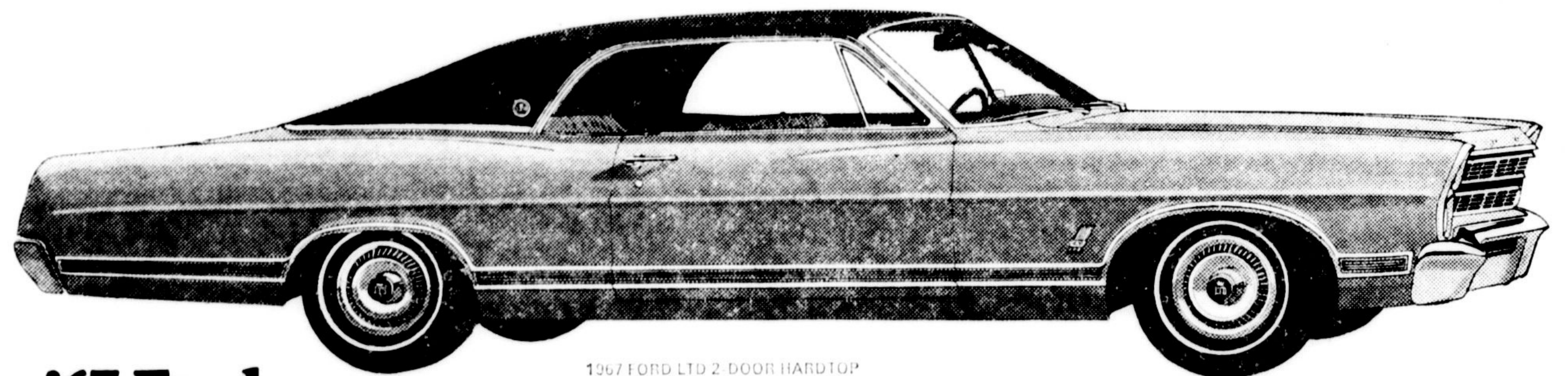

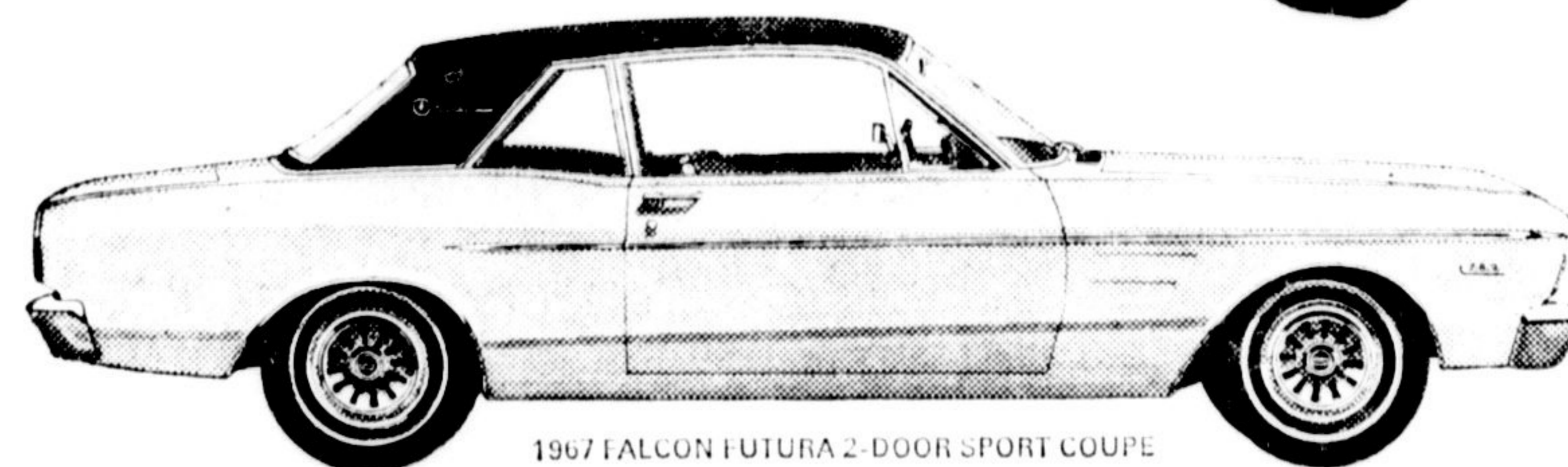

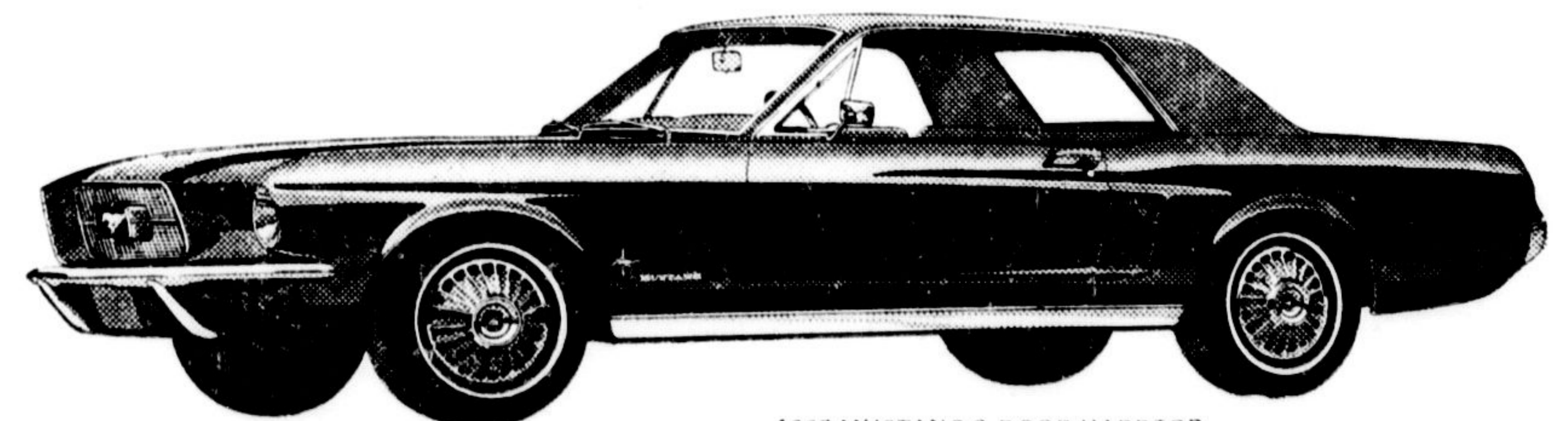
