


Sport Lites

The White Haired Man sits upright in the chair and stares straight ahead. Like a gusher he spouts pure gold — in the form of jems from Milton's sports past - and the visitor eagerly accepts the information and jots it down.

Murray "Drum" Campbell looks very much like a retired bank worker, and he is. All his training has taught him to keep things in orderly fashion, so when you ask a question, he digs quickly into his files of figures or memories or ideas and gives you the right answer.

As he stares, he recites without noticeable hardship, details of his days as a ball and hockey player in town. Often he'll

wander from the subject for as long as five or 10 minutes, and he'll mention facts like the Milton Inn's current layer of brick was applied in 1905. Then he'll return o the topic.

> His information is believed to be accurate and detailed, so when he outlines the lives of all his 1901 teammates, you can catch glimpse of the town's history. "Drum", a nick-name he carried for a long time, was applied because of the similarity between his name Campbell and camel. "It came from the dromedary camel, that's how I got it", he

In his baseball playing days from 1901-1906 he was a catcher. His mates on the 1901 junior team team included Roy Field at second base, Bill Atkinson the pitcher, Charlie Barber the third base-

man, Clarence Turner the centre fielder, Lon Wharton the shortstop, Bill Patterson the leftfielder, rightfielder Bill Winn, first baseman Rube Springgay and utility man Cecil Earl. The team played seven games against Acton and Toronto teams, "and we did pretty well for a first year team," he said. After mentioning each player he gave a brief description of their lives, and sometimes death.

Home ground for the "Victorias" was the fair grounds, but it wasn't nearly as good as it is now, he said. The diamond faced south rather than east, and there was no grandstand. Three or four hundred fans would show up for a game and the standard fee was 15 cents, "though quite a few didn't pay". Bill Atkinson, the pitcher, was a hard thrower and lanky Clarence Turner was a wizard in the outfield.

It was the era of the dead ball and home runs were few and far between. Players often used "corked" bats and many times the umpires would catch them and order them to use proper bats. Standard baseball stategy wasn't yet devised and it was primarily an "overpower them, rather than outsmart them", game. The rules were much the same, except for foul balls. They didn't count as strikes. "Fellows used to try to wear the pitchers out and hit as many as four or five fouls," he said.

The Milton players, capless and wearing black turtle necked sweaters, padded white knickerbocker trousers and black stockings, were among the best dressed performers around. Travel was tough in those days and a trip to Palermo would be planned a week in advance. "Now young chaps get in a car with their girl friend and head to a dance 20 miles away without even thinking about it. I remember when it used to take more than three hours to get to Oakville by horse and wagon. The roads were really dusty," he indicated.

When he was a youngster, baseball in the United States was coming closer to maturity. He and his teammates took a keen interest in big league ball and names like Iron Joe McGinnity, John McGraw and Willie Keeler were popular. "Keeler was one of the nicest batters I ever saw. He played out his career with Toronto and he was really good," Mr. Campbell claims. His memories also cover Milton's senior ball team which reaches as far back as 1896 when Acton won three games against Milton and then Milton won the next four games.

Lacross, now a forgotten game in the County Town, once was top ranked in popularity. Back in the late 1880's Milton had a particularly strong team and was considered one of the best in the province. The games were in the fair ground and he used to carry water to players on the field. He remembers, "the Milton team beat a top club from Toronto and the Toronto boys got pretty mad. A few of our better players had to go down to the hotel and praise them up, or there might have been a fight." Though it had its years of great popularity, the game gradually died out and 1900 it was a thing of the past.

From 1903-1907, he played on several local hockey teams which competed in Western Ontario Hockey Association and Ontario Hockey Association play. Hockey, he believed, was a fine game but he never enjoyed it as much as ball. Shinny games were played in the old curling rink on Mill St. and the opposition used to come from Galt, Preston, Hespeler, Berlin (Kitchener) and other centres.

It was the days of seven man hockey and according to Mr. Campbell, "the rover always got in the way, he ruined the combinations. I was glad when they changed the rule so that there were six men on a side." In the old curling rink the fans stood to watch the game — there were no seats — and the ice wasn't marked. "It was a wide open game then," he continued.

Mr. Campbell started working in Milton in the Old Bank of Hamilton at the excellent salary of \$100 a year and in December of 1907 he was transferred to Toronto, ending his sports career

Sports were only a physical outlet for him, not a love. Now, when prompted, he has a store of tales he's willing to devulge, but never uses the accepted phrases like "I loved baseball" or "hockey was great." He only tells of an era we'll never know with a knowledge, and an appreciation we can really admire.
