Dancing was enjoyed by all present following the wedding dinner. Music was supplied by a Toronto orchestra.

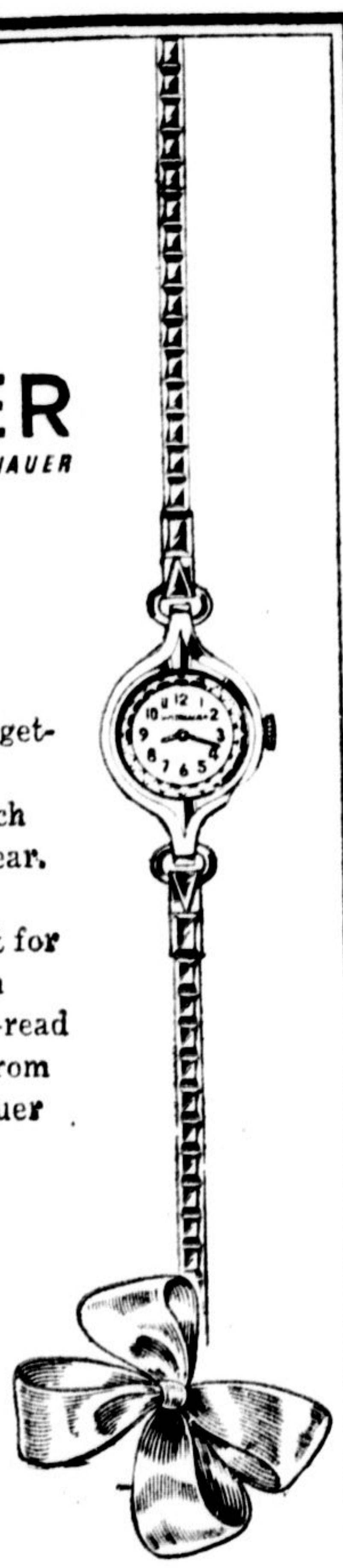
