

Awards presented to O.S.D.

The Senior School auditorium of the Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton, was packed to the doors with parents, friends and students on Friday afternoon for the presentation of awards to the school.

Mrs. Wideman of Kitchener presented the Bruce Lane McKenzie memorial trophies to the school for annual competition. The two trophies will be presented annually to the outstanding boy and girl athletes at the school. The awards were donated by parents and friends of the deaf from the Kitchener-Waterloo district. Bruce, a student at the Belleville school for the deaf in Ontario died following a car accident. The awards were accepted by Wayne Fox, Physical Education supervisor for the Senior School.

The Stanley Hall Memorial Award was presented by Halton M.P.P. George Kerr. The award, a cheque, will be made annually

to the graduating senior student who has shown the most ability and promise in his or her vocational training. The award is offered by the Progressive Conservative Association of Halton and friends of the late Mr. Hall, and is to be used for further training or for the purchase of equipment needed in the winners' chosen work. The award was accepted on behalf of the school by J. McCulloch, supervisor of the vocational school.

Senior school supervisor Gary Bunch accepted the Superintendent's Award for the school. The award was presented to the school by Superintendent and Mrs. D. E. Kennedy. It will be given each year to the most improved student in level 14. Every year one boy's or girl's name will be printed on the plaque and the winner will receive an amount of money. It will be awarded to the graduating student who has shown the

greatest progress in the academic and/or vocational school.

Sandra Bertin, Wayne Copeland, Doug Elligson, Gail Gies, Marlene Marchand, Norah McCabe, Diane Montieth, Diane Shantz and Robert Young had their names inscribed on the stu-

dent honor roll. All students from level 7 to 14 are eligible. Mr. Bunch announced the honor roll.

In his opening remarks Mr. Kennedy, chairman for the program, indicated, "in spite of the difficulties we believe this has

been a productive term. The students have helped us to help them and we hope this will be the pattern for the months and years to come."

The program concluded the open house for parents conducted at the school on Thursday.

16 accidents October toll

Milton police report 16 accidents occurred during the month of October, causing \$4,245 property damage. There were eight accidents of damage exceeding \$100 and as many non-reportable.

This brings the 1966 toll thus far to 149 accidents with \$35,940 damage. No injuries were reported during the month, but in the preceding months there have been 10.

So far in 1966, Milton has remained fatality-free.

Must stop if bus signals flashing

Ontario Provincial Police remind drivers that amendments were made to the School Bus Stop Law, effective September 1, 1966.

The law states that vehicles must stop in both directions when approaching or overtaking a school bus on a highway bearing a speed limit of 35 m.p.h. or over, when the "stop" signal lights are flashing. Instead of two amber signal-lights on the front, a bus is to be equipped with two red lights on front and rear.

The driver of the bus is expected to use the signals when taking on or discharging passengers, and continue using them until the children have arrived at the far side of the highway.

The words "do not pass when signals flashing" which must appear on a bus when it is used as school transportation must be concealed when the bus is not being used for children.

A sign reading "This vehicle stops at all railway crossings," which was compulsory, was repealed and neither public vehicles or school buses must bear this lettering now.

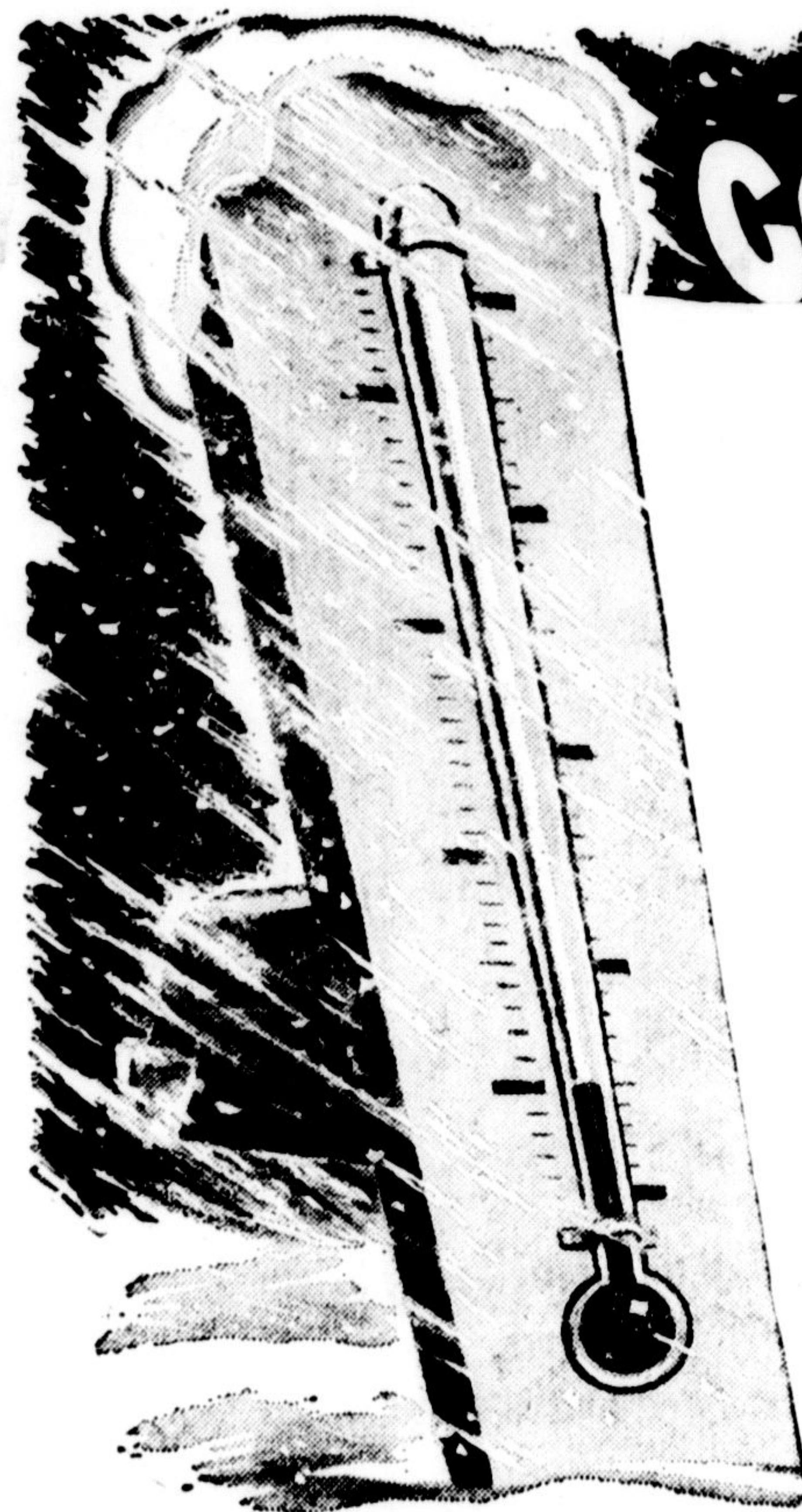

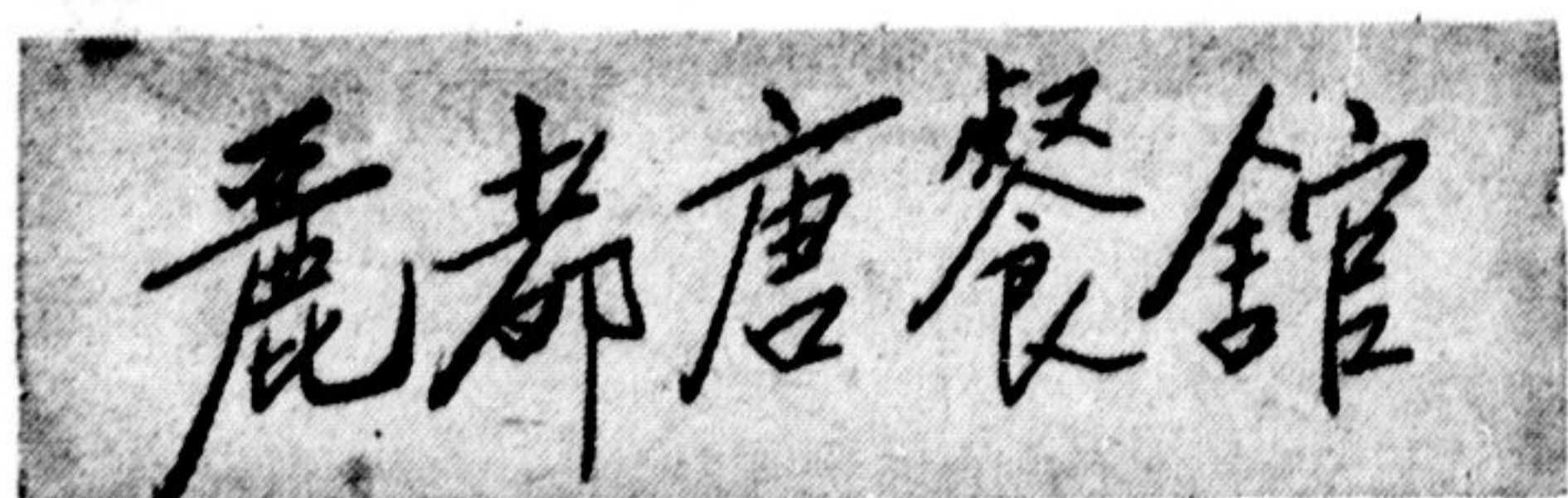
