

Ontario Provincial Police remind drivers that amendments were made to the School Bus Stop Law, effective September

Must stop if bus

The law states that vehicles must stop in both directions when approaching or overtaking a school bus on a highway bearing a speed limit of 35 m.p.h. or over, when the "stop" signal-lights are flashing. Instead of two amber signal-lights on the front, a bus is to be equipped with two red lights on front and rear.

The driver of the bus is expected to use the signals when taking on or discharging passengers, and continue using them until the children have arrived at the far side of the

The words "do not pass when signals flashing" which must appear on a bus when it is used as school transportation must be concealed when the bus is not being used for children.

A sign reading "This vehicle stops at all railway crossings," which was compulsory, was repealed and neither public vehicles or school buses must bear this lettering now.


