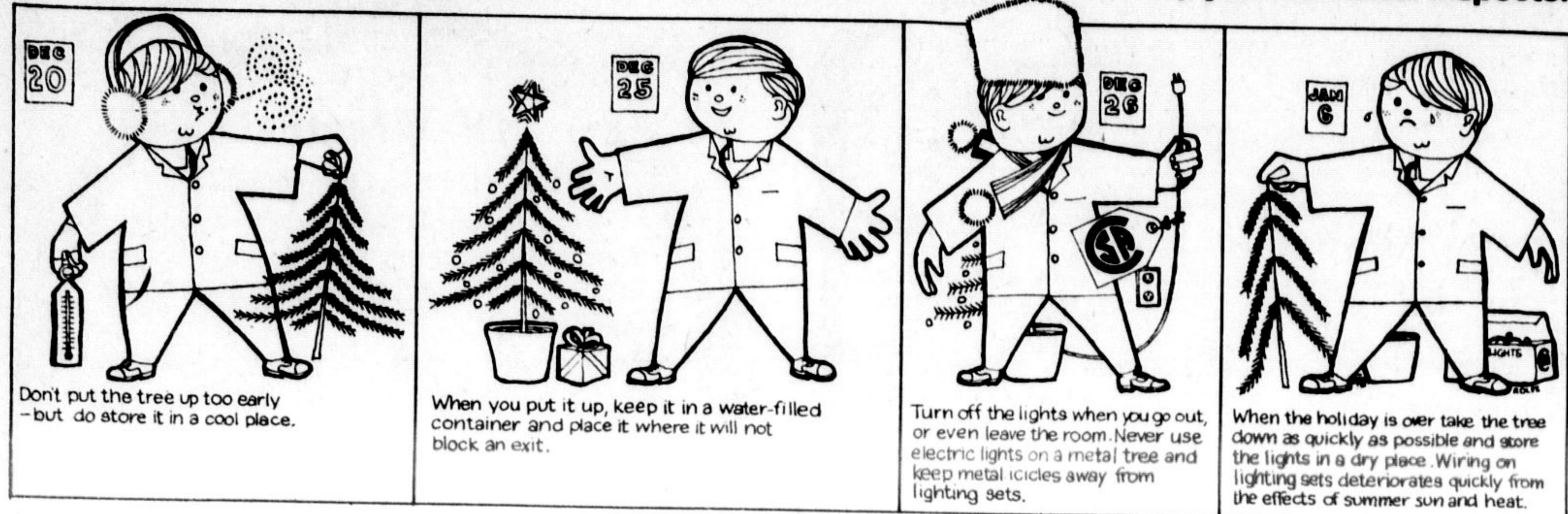

## Car stolen, damaged in rash of accidents

Three major accidents, one hit-and-run, and one extensively damaged stolen car; the five of them occurring on one day, made up the tally of automobile accidents in Milton in the past week.

The day was Saturday. The first accident involved a car driven by Noel Stutt of R.R. 6 Milton and one driven by Ed Googe of 376 George St., Milton.

The Stutt vehicle was stopped on Martin Street at the traffic light, preparing to make a left-hand turn onto Main St. The Googe vehicle was proceeding south on Martin behind Stutt's car at the time of the collision. Damage to the Stutt vehicle was \$250 while the Googe car suffered \$450 damage.

A vehicle owned and driven by Maxwell Bradbury of R.R. 3 Milton received \$225 damage when it was involved in a collision with a vehicle owned and driven by Gerry Pethany of Hornby.

The Bradbury car was pro-

ceeding north on Ontario St., the Pethany vehicle was traveling east on Main St. and had stopped when the collision occurred.

Later a vehicle driven by George Fletcher of 165 Bell St. received \$100 damage in a collision with one owned by Gerard Schouten of 45 Miles St. and driven by Douglas A. Downs of 64 John St.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Thomas and Sarah with the Schouten vehicle receiving \$200 damage.

A hit-and-run incident was reported in the parking lot of Diplomat Apartments, Ontario St. A car owned by Mrs. Doreen Akey received \$75 damage.

Late in the same evening a 1966 Dodge owned by Mrs. Audrey Brush of 322 Elmwood Crescent was stolen and the thief ended his journey among the trees bordering the curve on Bronte St. near the P. L. Robertson factory. Damage was \$3,000 and police are continuing their investigation.

## Gallery of Canadian history

The migration of the United Empire Loyalists from the United States to Canada had a far-reaching effect upon the history of our country. To the Loyalists belongs the credit of cementing the tie between Canada and the British Empire.

The first party of Loyalists to come to Canada, for settlement on the St. John's River, landed in May, 1783, at the site of the present City of St. John, N.B. They found a wilderness of rocks and trees; a few huts of French fishermen near the

shore were the only inhabitants. The figures of the young couple in the foreground of the picture are intended to represent those loyalists who left the coast and migrated inland, eventually establishing colonies throughout the Dominion, ever maintaining British justice and strengthening the unity of the Empire.



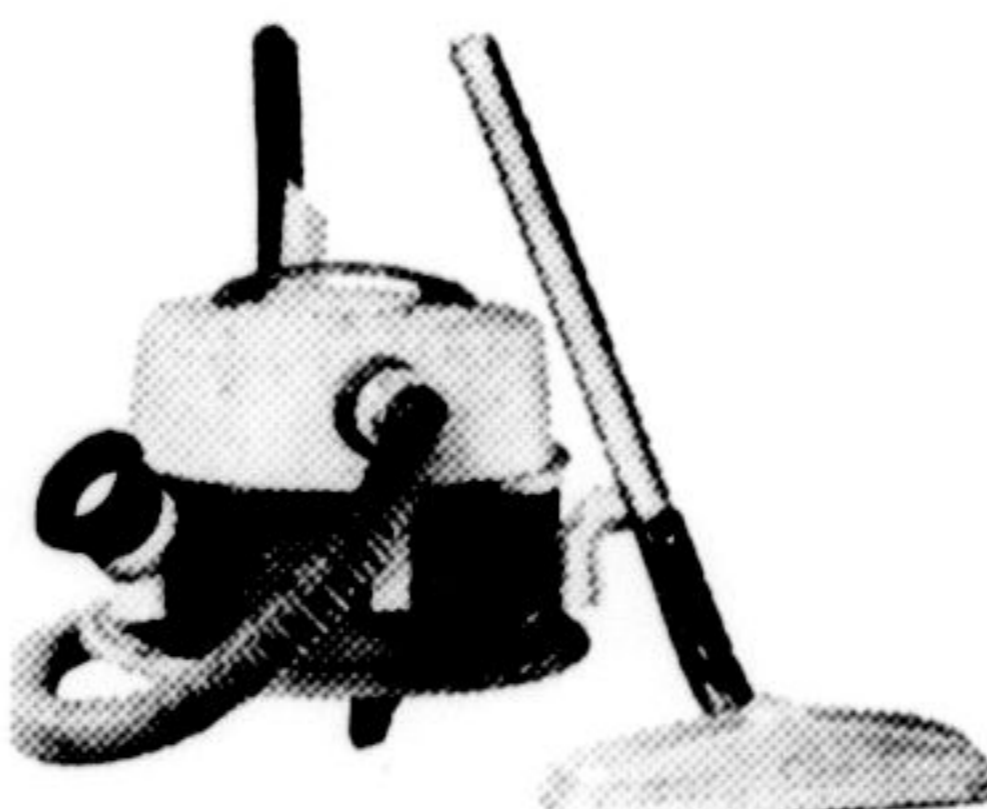

## Storm center

### Blocked eavestrough drain

"Everyone told me not to worry about it . . . but nothing was done", Dudley Ervin, Parkway Dr., complained to Milton Council Monday when he traced the origin of a blocked eavestrough drain that started when construction was undertaken on Williams Ave.

Mr. Ervin told council the superintendent on the job told him the drain from his eavestroughs which goes to the road would be looked after. He recalled he had attempted to dig it up himself, and had been ordered off the town property. After repeated assurances that it would be looked after, he left the matter.

The problem developed last winter and had gone unattended through the spring, summer and fall and now back to winter. Mr. Ervin noted he had contacted the mayor several times and was assured it would be looked after. The works superintendent had indicated it would be rectified.

"I told you it was my responsibility to tell me and I'd look after it", he reminded Mayor Childs, "but the final word came only recently, after the assurance it would be looked after, that it is now my responsibility."

Mr. Ervin referred to a letter from council following a report from the engineer in which responsibility for the problem was disclaimed.

Mr. Ervin noted neighboring properties' drains were not interfered with, but his was blocked and the freezing of the back-up water burst some of the eavestrough seams.

Councillor C. Johnson observed that there would be a lot less trouble with sanitary sewers if eavestroughs were drained to the streets, and suggested the works superintendent and chairman of the streets committee investigate the problem and submit a recommendation.
