auditorium to see a film called "Summer Magic". It was a good film. Then we went to the residence to get ready for bed. We had a good time at O.S.D.

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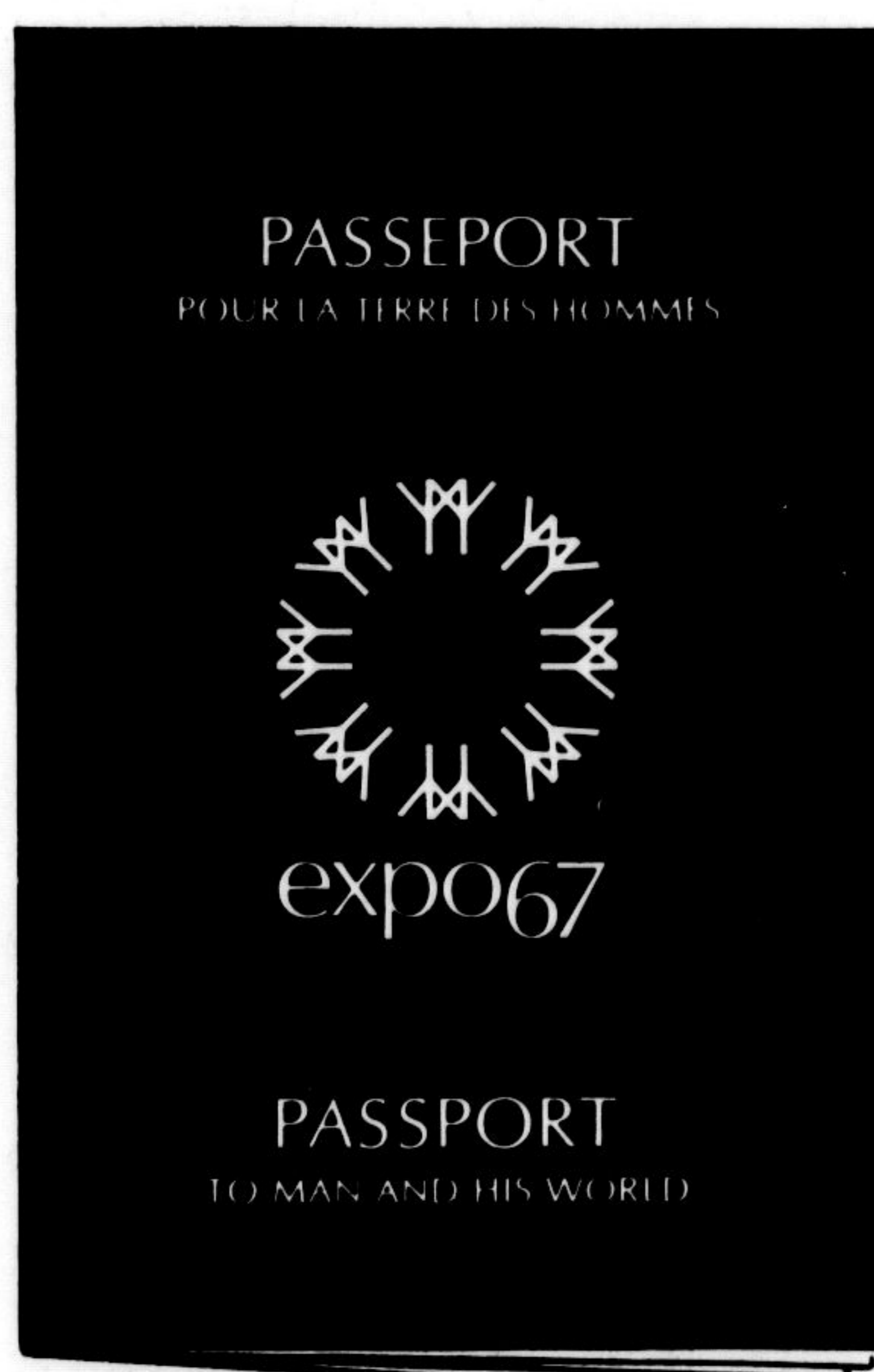
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
