

Public School Board Briefs



At the Monday night meeting of Milton Public School Board, the board:

- Approved the appointment of business administrator for the Ontario School for the Deaf, Arthur Brittain, as the board's representative on the Milton District High School Board. He will replace W. Gazely who is resigning.
- Accepted the resignation of Dion Bover, oral French teacher, who has broken his contract agreement with the board to accept a position at Elmvale, effective December 30.
- Approved the attendance of some board members at the January 15 to 18 conference of the Ontario Association of School Business Officials.
- Approved amounts paid from the current account previous to the meeting at \$23,387.79; amounts paid from the additional capital account to L. J. Zanatta at \$1,800; and amounts to be paid from the current account at \$2,993.28. Authority was also granted to cover accounts due up to December 31.
- Accepted a tender from J. C. Wilson and Co. to supply the board with disposable paper products for 1967.
- Approved the installation of a heat circulating pump in the library of Martin St. senior public school, which will cost \$145 installed, providing the practicability is obvious to the contractor, S. A. Fay and Sons.
- Decided to seek information on the replacement or repair of the time clock and bell system in the Martin St. senior public school.
- Received a report from attendance officer W. B. Elsley for the month of November.
- Learned the roof on the Martin St. senior public school is completely satisfactory and well drained, except in areas the contractor, Beaulieu Roofing, is already attending to.
- Heard chairman H. P. Johnson thank the board, Inspector L. McNeil and secretary Mrs. E. Martin for their support and guidance throughout 1966.
- Learned that the attendance at the end of November for all Milton Public Schools was 1,092 pupils. Average daily attendance was 976 pupils, compared to 987 the previous month, the decrease attributed to ill health the previous month.
- Viewed a film contributed and operated by Howard Norseworthy, Milton area representative of Culligan Water Softening, but decided to waive Mr. Norseworthy's offer to make the equipment available.

Received a letter from Bruce Street School principal Ray Morrison, expressing his appreciation of the board's action in obtaining safety markings on streets used by children from the school.

Heard a report from Fire Chief A. E. Clement including the evacuation time for the board's schools during fire drill. It was learned Martin St. Senior Public School
