Man, woman injured in week's accidents

Several serious accidents in the North Halton area were investigated by Milton O.P.P. during the past week. An Acton man and a Campbellville area woman were injured.

Late Monday afternoon on Highway 401 at the Milton overpass, the most serious crash of the week saw a 36-year-old Acton man, Alan John Cox of R.R. 1, Acton, hospitalized with severe head injuries. His east-bound car left the highway near the overpass, hit a Department of Highways sign, travelled a considerable distance, flew over 90 feet in the air and rolled over.

Mr. Cox was rushed to Milton District Hospital. The 1963 Volkswagen received \$1,000 damage to the roof and all four fenders, Const. L. Kneale reported. Mr. Cox was later transferred to the Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital in Burlington.

An R.R. 2, Rockwood, man's car collided with a deer on the Guelph Line a mile south of 30 Sideroad early Friday morning, causing \$250 damage and killing the deer. The driver was Ross Gordon. Game warden Jim Millford was called to dispose of the deer's carcass.

Fire broke out in the car of Charles E. Wright, 188 Churchill Rd. S., Acton, on Highway 7 near Acton Friday evening, and the car was demolished before

firefighters could douse the flames. The engine caught fire just outside Acton. Loss was estimated at \$1,500.

Nassagaweya resident Ila Jean Locke suffered face and chest injuries in a one-car accident on the Nassagaweya-Esqueving Town Line Sunday. Her car received \$500 damage when it skidded into a ditch, striking a tree and some rocks.

And an R.R. 2, Campbellville man, William George Pickett, had \$200 damage to his car when it skidded on a curve and landed in a rock pile on the First Line, Nassagaweya, Saturday afternoon.

Milton man vice-chairman Community College governors

J. A. Turner, Director of Education for Toronto Township, was elected Chairman of the Board of Governors for the new College of Applied Arts and Technology for Area 8 at the first meeting of the Board on Tuesday of last week.

J. W. Ostler of Milton was elected Vice-chairman.

The inaugural meeting of the Board was called by the Council of Regents for Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology.

Dr. H. H. Kerr, Chairman of the Council, and D. B. Sutherland, Executive Secretary, outlined to members of the new board their duties and responsibilities, as set out in the Act and Regulations setting up the Colleges.

N. A. Sisco, Director of Applied Arts and Technology Branch of the Department of Education, discussed with the Board the educational goals which the Colleges have been designed to meet.

The first problem facing the new Board is the selection of a name for the College. Once the name has been officially approved by the Council of Regents and the Minister of Education, the Hon. William G.

Davis, the Board will be legally incorporated.

Suspect fumes in accidents

Carbon monoxide is believed to be a factor in several unexplained car accidents in Halton recently, and Halton County Crown Attorney Peter K. McWilliams has asked police and coroners in the county to investigate the possibility of carbon monoxide poisoning in other accidents.

The deadly fumes of exhaust systems might have caused several drivers to "black out" and cause accidents which to date have not been easily explained.

Burlington Police are checking a 1962 European car involved in a November fatality to see if the driver may have blacked out from monoxide fumes, possible due to faulty hose connection.

Halton, Peel Trust will furnish room in Milton hospital
