Mr. Foster emphasized that much can still be accomplished and although the contest is over, owners would do well to make further improvements to beautify their rural lands.

Omagh friends are sorry to hear that Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lawson of Milton are both patients in Milton Hospital.

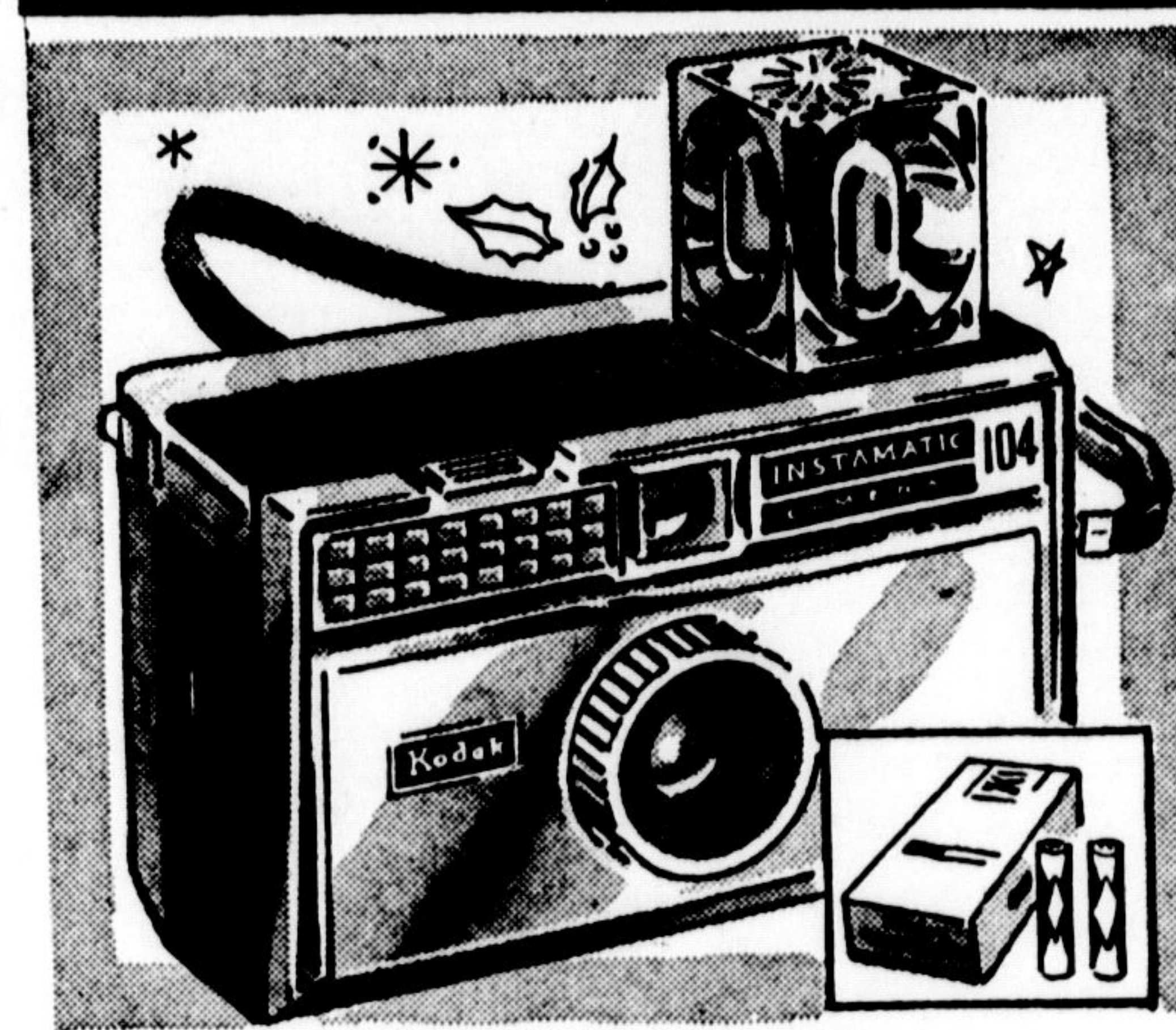
