

Appointments are highlight at '67 Nassagaweya inaugural

Appointments of council committees, representatives to outside boards and commissions, and special staffers for 1967 highlighted Nassagaweya Council's inaugural meeting Wednesday evening of last week.

Clerk J. C. McIntyre was re-appointed to the six-way post of clerk, treasurer, tax collector, assessment commissioner, welfare officer and building superintendent. M. R. "Mac" Anderson was re-appointed assessor and Mrs. Vera Cockram was again named assistant clerk. Roads superintendent Grant McMillan was also re-appointed.

At the same meeting, council adopted a recommended salary schedule and established the levels at which each of their present employees work. Minimum and maximum salaries were outlined in the by-law they approved.

Other employees appointed to work on a part-time basis included Fred Edwards, caretaker of the township hall and the memorial plot at Brookville; Sam Scott, township office custodian; J. S. Norrish, school attendance officer; E. J. Parsons and A. N. Norrish, livestock evaluators; Nelson Howard, poundkeeper; and

George Dredge, Ed Cairns, Jim Robertson and Charles Lasby, fence viewers. Rates of pay for each of these were also established by the by-law and some raises were granted.

High school board appointments included Ross Carbert returned to the Milton board and Duncan Moffat returned to the Acton board.

A. R. Service was re-appointed to the Milton Fire Area Board and Percy McGillivray and Jack Milne to the Acton board.

Councillor Anne MacArthur was named to replace Reeve William Coulter on the Halton Region Conservation Authority. Reeve Coulter said he had spent five years working with this group and wanted a new appointment from the township to carry on in the position. Councillor Ross Gordon was returned to the Grand River Conservation Authority.

Reeve Coulter was named council's delegate to Nassagaweya Planning Board. Maurice Newton and Gordon Agnew were re-appointed to the board for two-year terms, and Grant Campbell and Alex Near for one-year terms.

New planning board appointments are Fred Benson of Camp-

bellville and Douglas Beattie of Eden Mills. They replace Stewart Cramp and William Lowry, who both had served three years.

Reeve Coulter, Roy Wood, Ken Moore, Len Andrews, Jack McPhail, Claude Inglis and Councillor William Mahon were named to the Campbellville Community Centre Committee. Members noted a new community centre committee will be set up later this year to handle the centennial park at Eden Mills.

Council's own committees were all re-appointed for 1967. They are:

Roads, Deputy - Reeve William Hoey, Councillor Ross Gordon.

Property and building, Gordon and Hoey.

Assessment and planning, Councillor William Mahon, Councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur.

Personnel and office administration, Hoey and Gordon.

Finance and welfare, MacArthur and Mahon.

Legislation and by-laws, Mahon and MacArthur.

The reeve is also a member of all committees. The first named in each case is the chairman.

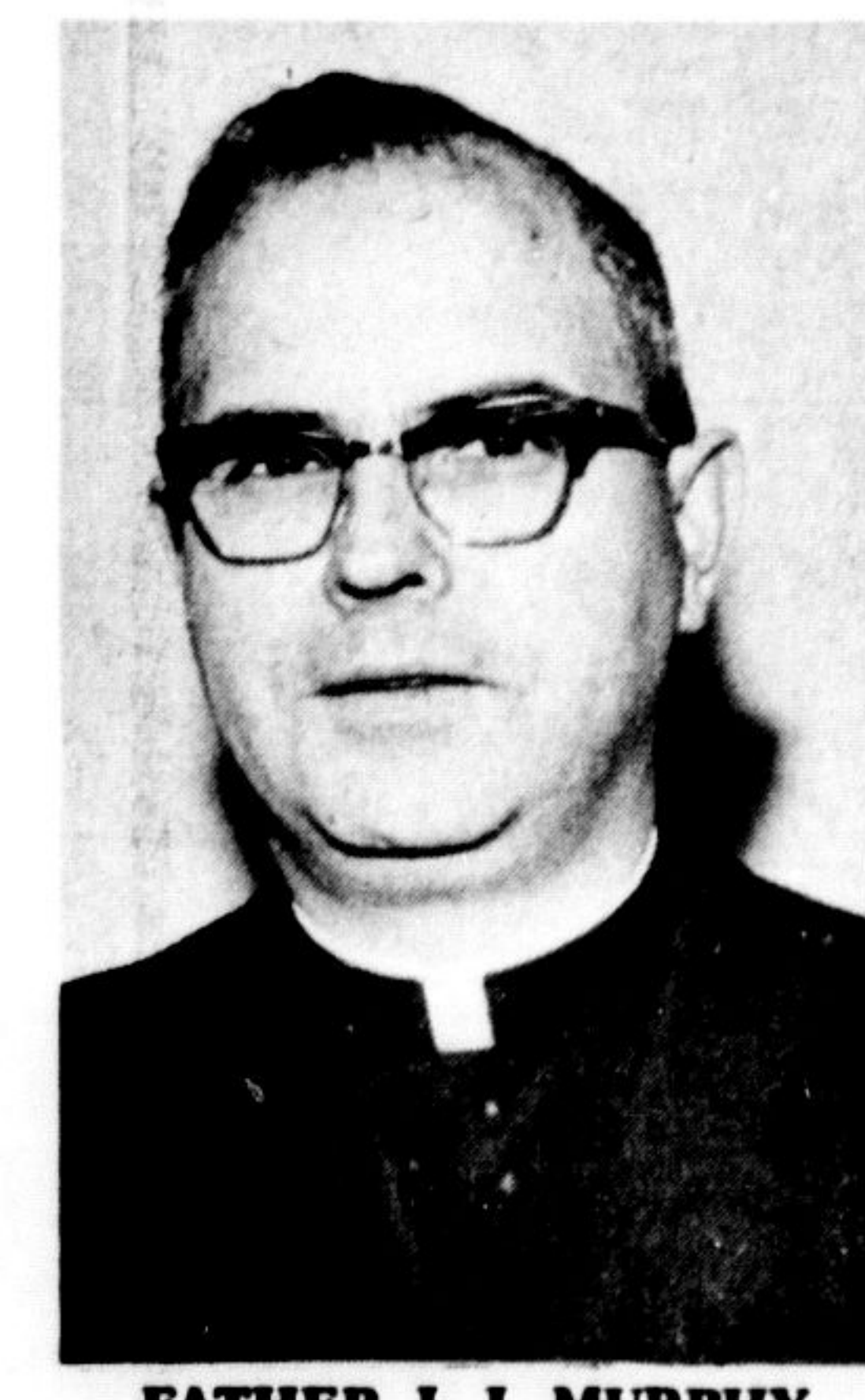

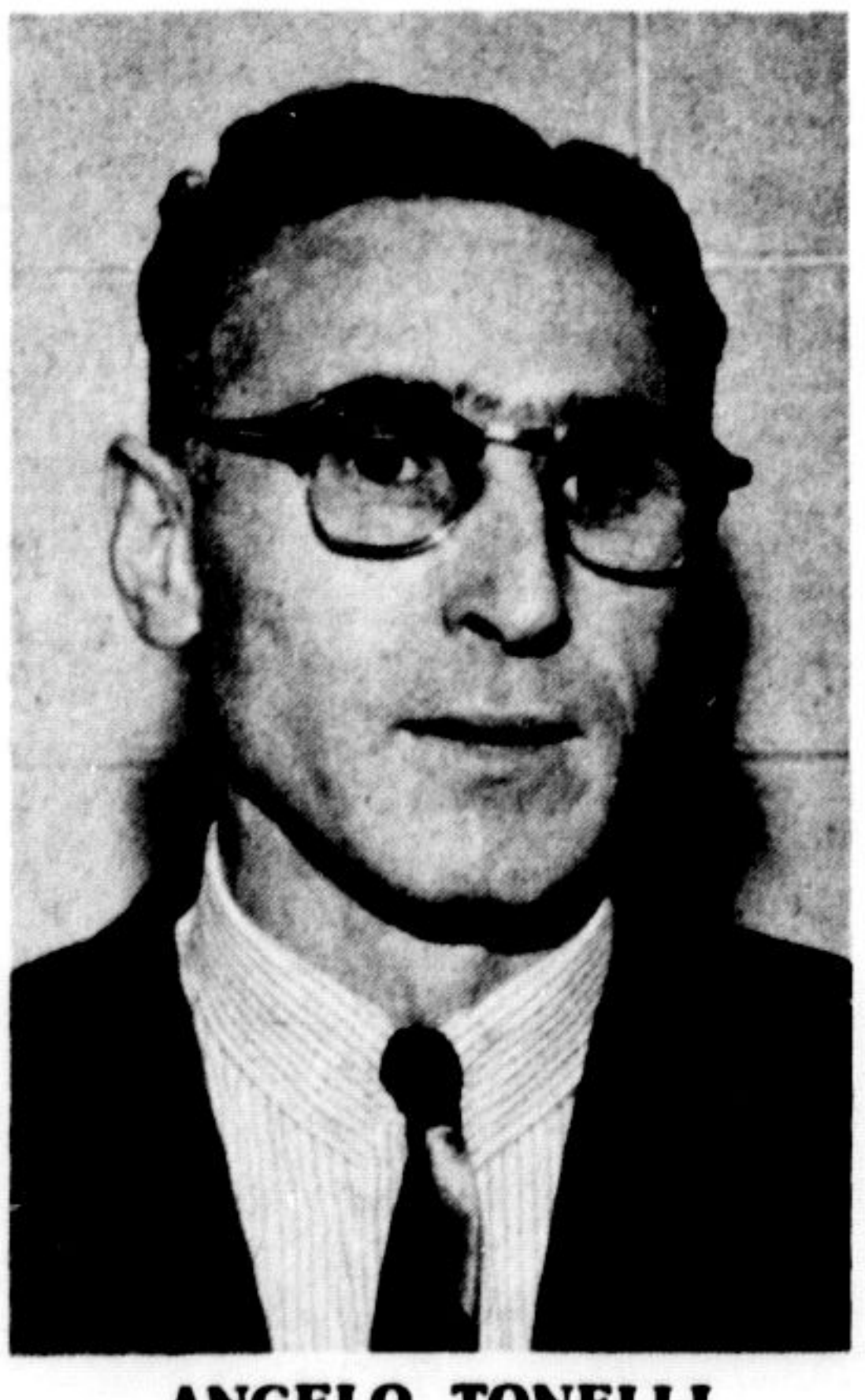

To improve Highway 5

Work is soon to begin on a \$2,500,000 rebuilding program on Highway 5 from Tansley Bridge to Waterdown Town Line, to convert it to a four-lane highway. Major intersections with extra lanes for both left and right hand turns are planned at Brant St., Guelph Line, Appleby Line and Walkers Line intersections.

Traffic lights will be placed at Guelph Line and at Brant Street.

Last year 4,500 vehicles a day travelled along the Burlington section of the road. This number is expected to reach 15,000 vehicles a day in 10 years.

The roadwork is expected to be completed by 1970.
