

## Outshoot rivals 35-16 but Merchants lose

Milton Merchants, not so long ago a fixture in third place in the Suburban League standings, now find themselves struggling to hold the post. Inability to capitalize from close in cost the locals a victory on Friday night as they outshot the visiting Oakville Blades 35-16 but still only managed a 4-4 tie.

Coaches Enio Scisizzi and Murray Grenke had their performers skating in fine style, but it wasn't enough. They couldn't pick the corners. In the opening period, the ever-present Merchants limited the Blades to only three shots on goaltender Bob Lee, while they were bombarding Blade stalwart Don McCaffery.

However, in the final minute the visitors jumped into the lead as Greg McCauley scored while his team was short-handed.

Leon Stickle, Brian Bond and Craig Brush hit for second period markers as Milton surged into a 3-1 lead and just before the end of the stanza, Jeff Ellis, a late cut from the Merchant squad last winter, made it 3-2.

Jim Keane's goal temporarily gave the locals a two-goal bulge but Ellis quickly narrowed the gap as he counted his second marker of the night. With less than 10 minutes left in the game, Bob Lee came up with two fine saves and then Wayne Bowden lifted in a rebound to notch the game for keeps.

Milton's next home game is Friday night against the Orangeville Greenhirts. On Thursday, January 19, the Merchants go to Newmarket. Friday, January 20, they host Newmarket and Sunday, January 22, they go to Aurora.

### Two periods of good hockey aren't enough against Raiders

Within the last week and one-half the Merchants have played the Raiders twice and turned in three solid periods of hockey. December 30th the Merchants were superior for the first period and folded. The result was a 5-2 defeat. Wednesday night the locals had two good periods and carried a 3-2 lead into the third stanza, before the curtain of mediocrity came down.

"I don't know why we can't play three good periods — the boys seem to be in condition. I can't figure it out, but it's certain we won't start winning against the top teams until we do. We'll have to skate hard for three periods if we're going to beat either Georgetown or Aurora," manager Parton said.

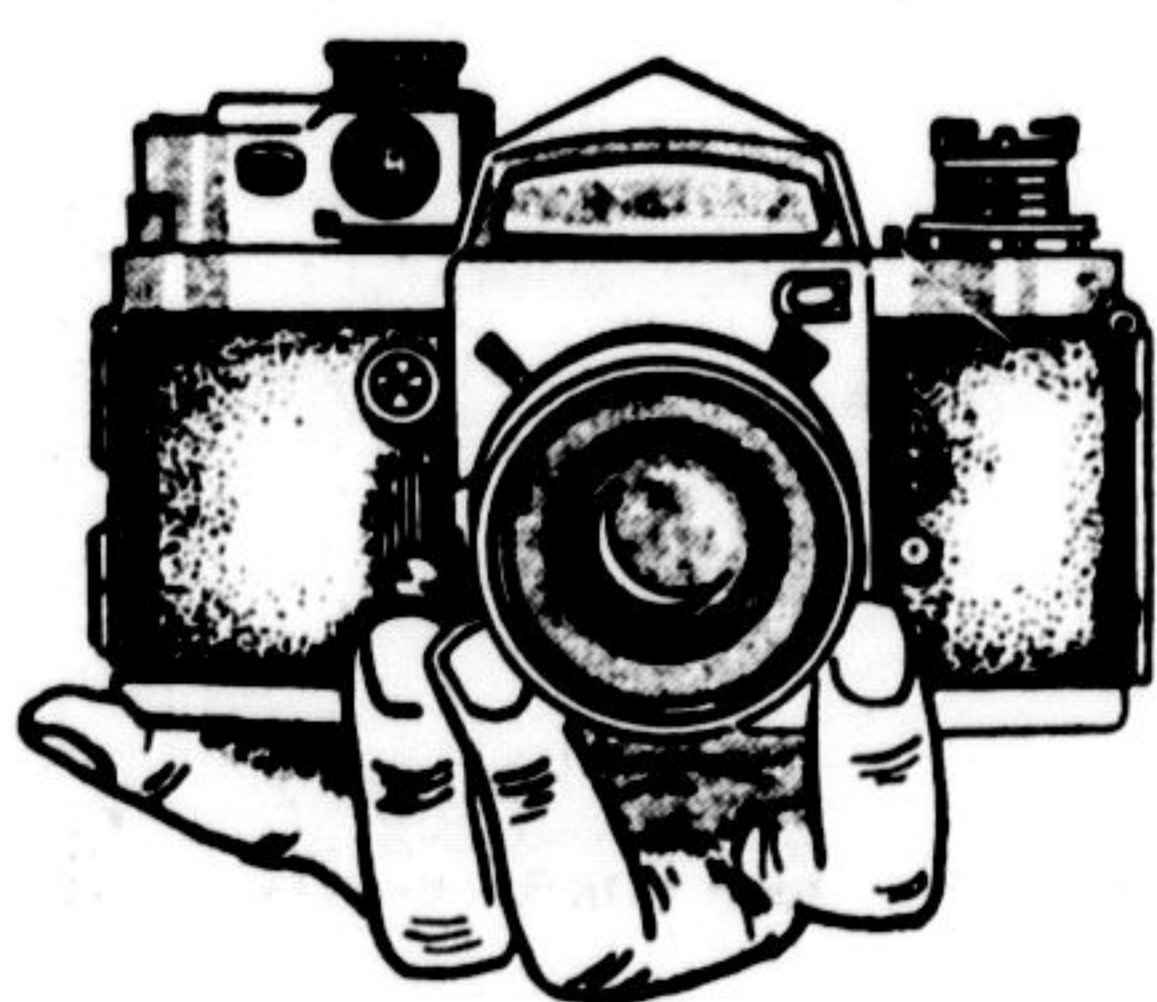
