Owners of Milton Industrial Park Limited, Court St. were granted permission by Milton Council Monday evening to construct a culvert to the town's specifications at the entrance to their property from Ontario St.  
The cost of the culvert should be paid by the property owners, Councillors agreed.

**Property owner John Tamai** phoned Mayor S. G. Childs and said that if the culvert could be installed, it would eliminate the need for trucks lining up on George Street to get into the Industrial Park property.  
Last week ratepayers from Court and George Sts. appeared at Council complaining about the use of the two streets by heavy commercial traffic.

Prior to the construction of the new Hydro substation on Ontario St. trucks used a long private road running parallel to the CPR tracks.

## Co-operative medical service completes 20 years service

Halton Co-Operative Medical Services, a member-owned and operated co-operative providing medical services at cost to its members, completed its 20th year at the annual meeting and dinner held in Georgetown on Saturday.  
Reports during the meeting indicated it was a successful year, despite the considerable changes in operations necessary since the Co-Op was founded. In recent years, the Ontario government has taken over the hospitalization field, and numerous organizations now cover the physicians' services.  
The co-operative lost approximately 10 per cent of its membership during 1966 when the government's OMSIP was introduced. Directors' reports Saturday indicated there are still 2,324 individuals served by H.C.M.S., with 883 actual contracts including 656 carrying the comprehensive coverage plan and 27 under the surgical and major medical plan.  
A gross margin of \$21,258 was reported on 1966 operations. Earned premiums were \$86,266 and claims cost \$65,008. Deduction of administration expenses and the addition of other income showed a net savings for the year of \$15,358, compared to \$2,343 in the previous year.

Directors re-elected for three year terms were Tom Alderson, W. R. Hume and Dr. J. W. Turvey. Frances W. Wilson Jr. was elected to replace J. N. Bird who resigned. G. H. Gard and Partners, chartered accountants, were re-appointed as auditors.

Other directors still filling unexpired terms on the 12-man board of directors include Harold C. Biggar, R. L. Davidson, Clifford Brown, Mrs. Roy Wilson, Sam Finnie, Arthur B. Harris, Albert Hunter and George Robertson.  
Speakers during the afternoon included Georgetown Mayor Joseph Gibbons, Halton County Warden William J.

Vice-president W. R. Hume, who presented the directors' report, reviewed that in the past year the Co-Op moved to a new office at 143 Main St. Members were advised that doctors' fees for visits will increase after April 1. The resignation was announced, effective this month, of secretary-treasurer Mrs. Fred Edwards after three years of service, and Mrs. Murray Tasker has been appointed to replace her. Miss Susan Anderson has joined the staff, taking the place of Mrs. Barbara Andrews, who resigned last month.

**Turn down flag day**

11 is Armistice Day and it is not a statutory holiday. Which is more important?" Mayor S. G. Childs called for a vote and the motion was defeated as Councillor Johnson changed his mind. "I've decided we should settle Armistice Day first, it's more important," he said.
