## Seek Milton water for Heights, Peru

Nassagaweya and Esquesing Council representatives will meet soon with representatives of Milton to seek permission to obtain water for the town's line originating at wells in Kelson Conservation Area and paralleling Highway 401 to Milton.

The Ontario Water Resources Commission told Nassagaweya Council Monday in a letter, they would undertake a feasibility study which would be prepared on the assumption water would be supplied from the line supplying Milton. The OWRC urged the council to meet with Milton representatives for permission to tap the line.

Wells in the Milton Heights area have become contaminated and since part of the Milton Heights and Peru area is in Esquesing and part in Nassagaweya, both townships are involved. It was estimated 12 houses were located in Nassagaweya and about 85 in Esquesing. It is anticipated a water supply would be provided on a local

improvement basis. Reeve W. Coulter and Councilor W. Mahon were named to meet with Esquesing and with Milton.

## Rev. J. L. Graham retiring

## Milton Council Briefs



Milton Council had one of its shortest meetings of the year on Monday evening — just over an hour long. Members adjourned early to allow the finance committee to hold a meeting and discuss staff salaries. During the regular session:

- Mayor S. G. Childs reported the Works Superintendent Bruce McKerr was discussing a culvert with the owners of an industrial property on Court St., whose laneway was cut off by a new hydro substation.

- Members congratulated Reeve Austan Ledwith on his election as chairman of the Halton Children's Aid Society for 1967.

- An application to the Ontario Municipal Board was approved, seeking permission for additional expenditures of \$9,000 on the Williams Ave. reconstruction project, extending the term of debentures from 10 to 20 years, and seeking permission for an additional \$7,500 expenditure on the Main - Ontario Sts. reconstruction.

- Daylight Saving Time was scheduled from Sunday, April 30 at 2 a.m. to Sunday, October 29 at 2 a.m.

- A portion of the 1966 levy was approved for Milton Public School Board, at \$25,000.

- Members approved closing the town office Friday

Funeral service was held at St. Joseph's church on February 24 for Fred Metcalf, a security guard who passed away in Guelph General Hospital on Feb. 20. He had been in failing health since December and was 60 years of age.
