Mrs. Dave Brush, unofficial scrap-book keeper for the Milton Hockey Scene, pointed out this week that five playing members of the Nadalin Electric Juvenile Flyers were in uniform with the Milton Kinsmen Pee Wees when the club captured the Pee Wee "B" crown in 1960-61. Flyer goaltender Phil Brush, defenceman John Forbes and forwards Paul Kitchen, Marty Seeds and Keith Higgs are hold-overs from the '60-'61 Pee Wee titlists. The team, also the winner of the West Metro division championship in the Little N.H.L. Tournament, was coached by Chuck Gervais and managed by Herb Higgs. Other members of that squad were Maurice Cassidy, Gary Andress, Brian Brush, Tom Sargent, Doug Hearns, Doug Naylor, Andy Berry, P. Mountain, Gerry Devlin, Steve Keane, E. McDuffe and Dave Hunter.

Bobby Orr, prize rookie with the Boston Bruins this winter, played in the same Little N.H.L. tourney that year. The Milton team was the first team ever to win the O.M.H.A. championship. It was the second year the Pee Wees competed in O.M.H.A. playdowns, but the first year there were only zone championships.




