The Bureau cautions against open bonfires and grass fires. If incinerators are allowed under your community's by-laws, make sure yours is equipped with a lid and that someone is there to watch it, in case embers spread to grass or nearby

The Bureau does not recomend burning dead grass at this time of year. It's too dangerous when the grass is so dry.

After a heavy winter's use, your furnace should be cleaned and checked over by a reliable serviceman. Make sure no stovepipes touch walls or partitions. Store flammable liquids in safety-approved storage cans and check your fire extinguisher (every home should have one) to make sure it is fully charged and ready for emer-
