## Centennial project

### Suggest Spring clean-up to make home fire-safe

For those who don't have a 1967 centennial project underway right now, Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau has an idea: "Make a spring clean-up your own personal centennial project for 1967." The Bureau suggests on 10,000 clean-up posters its member fire departments are distributing.

The new posters going out to home and business places in Oakville, Milton, Acton, Georgetown and the North Halton townships of Esquesing and Nassagaweya should prompt homeowners to dig into the project with gusto, the Bureau hopes. Artwork on the posters includes a picture of a firefighter pointing to the heading, "Carelessness Costs Dollars" and a large replica of Canada's centennial symbol.

"Check your home — prevent fires," the posters urge. "Remember, every fire call is an expense to your community."

What's the value of a Spring clean-up at your home? The Bureau points out that many homes are filled with fire hazards every Spring, following

the winter's accumulation of rubbish. Go through your home from attic to basement (don't forget the garage) and get rid of anything you no longer need. Make your home more fire-safe with a Spring clean-up, members said, and there is a good chance your home will still be around when Canada celebrates her second centennial.

The Bureau cautions against open bonfires and grass fires. If incinerators are allowed under your community's by-laws, make sure yours is equipped with a lid and that someone is there to watch it, in case embers spread to grass or nearby buildings.

The Bureau does not recommend burning dead grass at this time of year. It's too dangerous when the grass is so dry.

After a heavy winter's use, your furnace should be cleaned and checked over by a reliable serviceman. Make sure no stopcocks touch walls or partitions. Store flammable liquids in safety-approved storage cans and check your fire extinguisher (every home should have one) to make sure it is fully charged and ready for emergencies.

Don't use flammable liquids for cleaning clothing. Look in your dryer and make sure the motor is not clogged with lint or dust. Make sure there are no matches or lighters lying around where children can reach them. Get rid of oily or paint-soaked rags, and check beneath every stairwell to make sure nothing is stored there.
