Presbyterian Fellowship House opened in Winnipeg in 1960. In 1964 a second house was opened. In 1961 a hostel in Kenora provided a centre for community life. The change from reserve to city or town is a great one. We need a centre to inform Indians of social services in cities after they leave the reserve. We must

Milton Optimist Club was represented at the competition by Alexander Dorst, a Grade 8 student at Holy Rosary Separate School



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
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
