Instructor Campbell pointed out the club operates under rules. Students work slowly through the various tosses, throws and holds — they must know one perfectly before a new one is taught. They are taught respect for their instructors and their opponents, must pay attention at all times, and must not speak during lessons. No horseplay is tolerated, and a student must learn to control his temper before he is allowed to enter any combat with another student or an instructor.

Judoists progress through a series of colored belts before they attain the goal of every learner — the coveted black belt and its varying degrees of skill. The beginner wears a white belt, and as he progresses he earns a colored belt for various levels of efficiency. Yeliow follows white, then orange, green, blue, brown and black. You must have a blue belt before you can teach the sport to another.

Instructor Boothby has a brown belt and instructor Campbell wears a blue.

All students go through a gruelling 45 - minute warm - up period before each lesson — to work out the kinks and get their limbs in shape for the throws and falls that come later in the lesson.

Eventually, the instructors said, the club will enter competitions with district judo clubs. In a competition, you have to throw your opponent with a good, clean throw once to beat him, or give him two "average"

Students will also be instructed in "ground techniques" or what to do with an opponent after you have him down on the mat. Several pin and strangle positions are available with which you can make your opponent submit, or you can claim a victory if you can maintain the hold for 25 seconds.

Judo, according to the records, is still a young sport in Canada. It was introduced in Vancouver in the early 1930's and was confined to that district until after the Second World War when the Japanese people moved inland, and their sport spread.

In 1964 judo took a great step forward when it was proclaimed an Olympic event. Canadian Doug Rogers got to the finals that year before being eliminated in the heavy weight

Now, clubs are springing up across the nation. The sport is also becoming popular with the ladies, who are mainly interested in self defense. Using the proper judo knowledge, a tiny girl can make a big bully look like a fool with one well placed chop or kick, or toss over the
