Up to \$2,500[∞] in Capital Grants available to Ontario Farmers

The Government of Ontario has increased its Capital Grants program by \$129,000,000 effective April 1, 1967, and continuing through 1979. Farmers can apply for the following Capital Grants:

First

You can get up to \$1,000 based on one third of the cost of: Erection or renovation of farm buildings — paving barn yards liquid manure storage tanks grading, packing and storage buildings greenhouses — silos — grain storage and milk houses, or a combination of these.

Second

Fifty per cent of the cost of a drilled, bored or dug well, or for the development of a special source of water, up to \$500 under the ARDA program.

Under ARDA these Capital Grants continue to be available. Forty per cent of the cost of field enlargement up to \$500. Fifty per cent of the cost of digging a farm pond up to
