Set June opening date

Support county Bd. of Education

Support for a single, county-wide Board of Education was expressed by members of Milton Public School Board Monday when they considered the recently-released report of the County Consultative Committee on Education.

Board members referred to their initial briefs on the subject, and noted their proposal at that time had been for the single county board.

A brief on the subject was prepared for referral to Milton Council for its consideration.

During the regular meeting members also established June 21 as the date for the official opening of the Martin St. Senior Public School and auditorium. Guest speaker on that occasion will be W. G. Chatterton, assistant superintendent of the Department of Education.

An evening program for the official opening was planned in the new auditorium, followed by refreshments.

The Board accepted with regret the resignation of Mrs. Patricia Copeland of the J. M. Denyes staff and appointed

seven new teachers to the local schools. These included Miss Eleanor Preiss of Clifford; Miss Donna Jane Neal of Exeter; Lee Fleming of Carlisle; Miss Nancy Smotek of Greensville; Mrs. Jean Stringer and Mrs. Susan Snider of Milton, and Mrs. Linda Hands of Burlington.

In reviewing the current salary schedule, members agreed to delete the maximum of \$1,500 allowance for previous experience to attract further experienced teachers.

The words reading "High School" over the entrance to the Martin St. school are to be removed and a bronze plaque was ordered, changing the designation to the Martin St. Senior Public School.

In other business trustees reviewed insurance, discussed storage of records, made plans for repairs to the roof of the Bruce St. school, learned drinking fountains had been repaired, and authorized the Bell Telephone to lay an underground conduit on school property parallel to Ontario St. Authorization was also given

for the planting of a Centennial tree at each of the three schools at a location chosen under the direction of the principals. A Shadblow Serviceberry flowering tree was selected.

10 days of service

Seven mailmen walk routes in cold wrongly addressed mail headache

Milton's seven postmen, who started the town's first letter carrier delivery service on May 1, have been hard at work for the past 10 days and getting to know the routes around the town and Milton Heights area.

Their five carrier routes cover a total walking distance of 65,815 yards and encompass 2,075 points of call in the two communities. Outlying areas are served by small trucks called "mailmobiles" but the majority of the routes are covered on foot.

Despite the fact they had a wet start at their new jobs (it rained, hard, for the first two days of the first week and the weather hasn't been too good ever since) the postmen are enjoying their work and only "the usual" problems have had to be overcome, according to Charles Middleton of the district office who helped them launch the new service.

Improperly addressed mail is the major headache, and

several other kinks in the system had to be ironed out in the first few days.

Any mail coming into Milton which does not carry the correct street name and number has had to be rerouted to two ladies who sort file cards and affix the proper address. Residents of the area served must inform their correspondents of the correct address or it will be delayed in the re-addressing process, postal officials warn.

Mr. Middleton said the seven men will be switched around from time to time and take different routes during the first few months of the service. When each man has properly learned the five routes, two supervisors will be picked from among the seven postmen, to head up the service and relieve for sickness or holidays or days off.

"Walk" number one presently covers Ontario St. south of Oak St. including Parkway, Halton and Campbell Aves, plus Ontario St. north of Mountainview Dr., Base Line, Kingsleigh Court and Martin St. south to the C.N.R.

The second walk takes in all the Fallingbrooke area plus Thomas and Commercial Sts. south of Sydney Ave.

Another covers Main St. from the Post Office to Bronte and calls between Bronte, Barton and Commercial Sts.

Number four takes in Mill and Victoria St. area plus Martin St. north to the C.N.R., Riverplace, Woodward, Mountainview, Highside and part of Ontario St.

The fifth route includes the Broadway and George St. areas south to Oak St. and the

area around Charles, Mary and Queen Sts.

The walks range from a low of 10,430 yards to a high of 15,770 yards.
