Support county Bd. of Education

Support for a single, countywide Board of Education was expressed by members of Milton Public School Board Monday when they considered the recently-released report of the County Consultative Committee on Education.

Board members referred to their initial briefs on the subject, and noted their proposal at that time had been for the single county board.

A brief on the subject was prepared for referral to Milton Council for its consideration.

During the regular meeting members also established June 21 as the date for the official opening of the Martin St. Senior Public School and auditorium. Guest speaker on that occasion will be W. G. Chatterton, assistant superintendent of the Department of Educa-

An evening program for the official opening was planned in the new auditorium, followed by refreshments.

The Board accepted with regret the resignation of Mrs. Patricia Copeland of the J. M. Denyes staff and appointed

In reviewing the current salary schedule, members agreed to delete the maximum of \$1,500 allowance for previous experience to attract further experienced teachers.
