FARMERS' BRIEF WAS NOTHING NEW

Dear Jim:
I would like to express the thanks of the directors and members of Halton Federation of Agriculture on the excellent coverage given by Roy Downs in The Champion on the recent Farmers' March to Ottawa. We are truly grateful that he was able to be with us, he said it was a sight that he won't forget for a while and I would have to agree with him. He and I, along with many others were able to view the tremendous crowd from the speakers' platform — an excellent vantage point.

Since I was one of the people chosen to discuss the farmers' problems stated in the brief, it was necessary for me to go to Ottawa the afternoon previous to the march, so was sorry that I was unable to travel by bus with the rest of those from Halton County. The full committee met for final arrangements on the evening of May 23.

It is here where I would like to set the record straight, brought to my attention in the column "Harley to Halton" by Dr. Harry Harley, M.P. for Halton and I quote, "I refer to the Farmers' March which took place on Wednesday, May 24. I was present during the presentation of the brief to the Cabinet by the leaders of the March. They expected an immediate answer to their brief which had been in the hands of the

government for approximately 24 hours. This did not give the government time to study and discuss the matters in the brief." End of quote.

The truth of the matter is that the preliminary brief was public knowledge for 10 days before the March and contained all that was asked for in the main brief that was presented to the Cabinet, with the exceptions of facts and figures to back up our demands.

Further, there was nothing new in the brief that had not been presented to the Minister of Agriculture or the government before. All the points in the brief had been requested by the Canadian Federation of Agriculture and the National Farmers' Union in briefs that they had presented both this year and last. The March was to impress upon the government the fact that we needed some ACTION, and it was the Federal Dairy Policy announcement that brought it on at this time.

The special planning committee, of which I was a member, had arranged for a coordinator in Ottawa in the person of Ellard Powers to make all the arrangements for the March committee with the government, Mounted Police, the Ottawa Police, Parks Department, etc., and he is to be commended for a thorough job of organization.

Up until 8 p.m. on May 23 the agreed plans were that the special committee was to DISCUSS the brief with the Prime

Minister and his Cabinet at 10.30 a.m. on May 24. As mentioned before, there was nothing new in it to be presented. At 8 p.m. on May 23 Mr. Powers was asked to present himself on the Hill as there had been a change made. He was told the brief would have to be read, then the Prime Minister, Jos. Greene and M. Sauve would comment on it. There was to be no discussion.

On May 24 at 11 a.m. (another change) the brief was read to the Hon. Mr. Pearson and his cabinet; about the middle of the reading Mr. Pearson was called out to take an urgent telephone message regarding the crisis in the near East. He apologized for having to leave the meeting, stating that he would be back. He returned about the time the reader was finished reading the brief. He spoke to us for a few minutes, agreed that we had some problems, but could not agree with all that was said and then had to leave again, handing the meeting over to Mr. Green, Minister of Agriculture.

Mr. Greene proceeded to tell those present all that had hap-

pened since 1962. He took up all the allotted time there was for the meeting in doing so and did not give Mr. Sauve, Minister of Forestry, time to answer for his responsibility to some of the requests made in the brief. This irritated the French Canadian members of the committee and quite a heated argument went on between the Quebec leaders and Mr. Greene at this point.

We were then told that the farmers had assembled in front of the Parliament Buildings, so the meeting adjourned inside and we went out to our places.

We sincerely hope that this clears up the misconception that the brief was something new.
