URGES TOWN ACCEPT 1965 PARKING PLAN

To the Editor: It appears that the Parking Authority has been unable to convince the merchants that they should accept the proposal for paying for the parking lot off Mary Street. I dislike interfering in another matter, as I do not really want to run all the Town's affairs, but as a taxpayer I regret having all that time and money spent on studying the matter, along with the extension of Mary Street and with nothing accomplished. Accordingly I ask that my proposal to Council, on Parking, dated August, 1965, which was printed in The Champion also, be tried, as I am certain it can be either used as presented, or altered slightly to provide a workable solution to this whole question.

There are parts in the proposal the merchants rejected which should be altered.

The merchants' share of the cost of the parking lot should be divided amongst them in proportion to the number of parking spaces each should provide. It is stupid to insist on dividing this cost in proportion to assessment, as there is no assurance that ability to pay or parking needed are in proportion to the assessment.

Those merchants on the south side, who will be able to have an entrance off the parking lot should pay a somewhat higher amount than those who cannot have such an entrance. I do not know what proportion of the cost of the parking lot was to have been paid by the citizens, but they should have to pay part. It would be better for the citizens to have a good parking lot and pay part of the cost, than to have

to pay all the cost, which is the situation when there are meters on the streets.

I do urge that some proposal along the lines I have suggested be presented to the merchants. It will have a better chance of acceptance than the proposal they turned down. M. S. Kernighan, P. Eng.

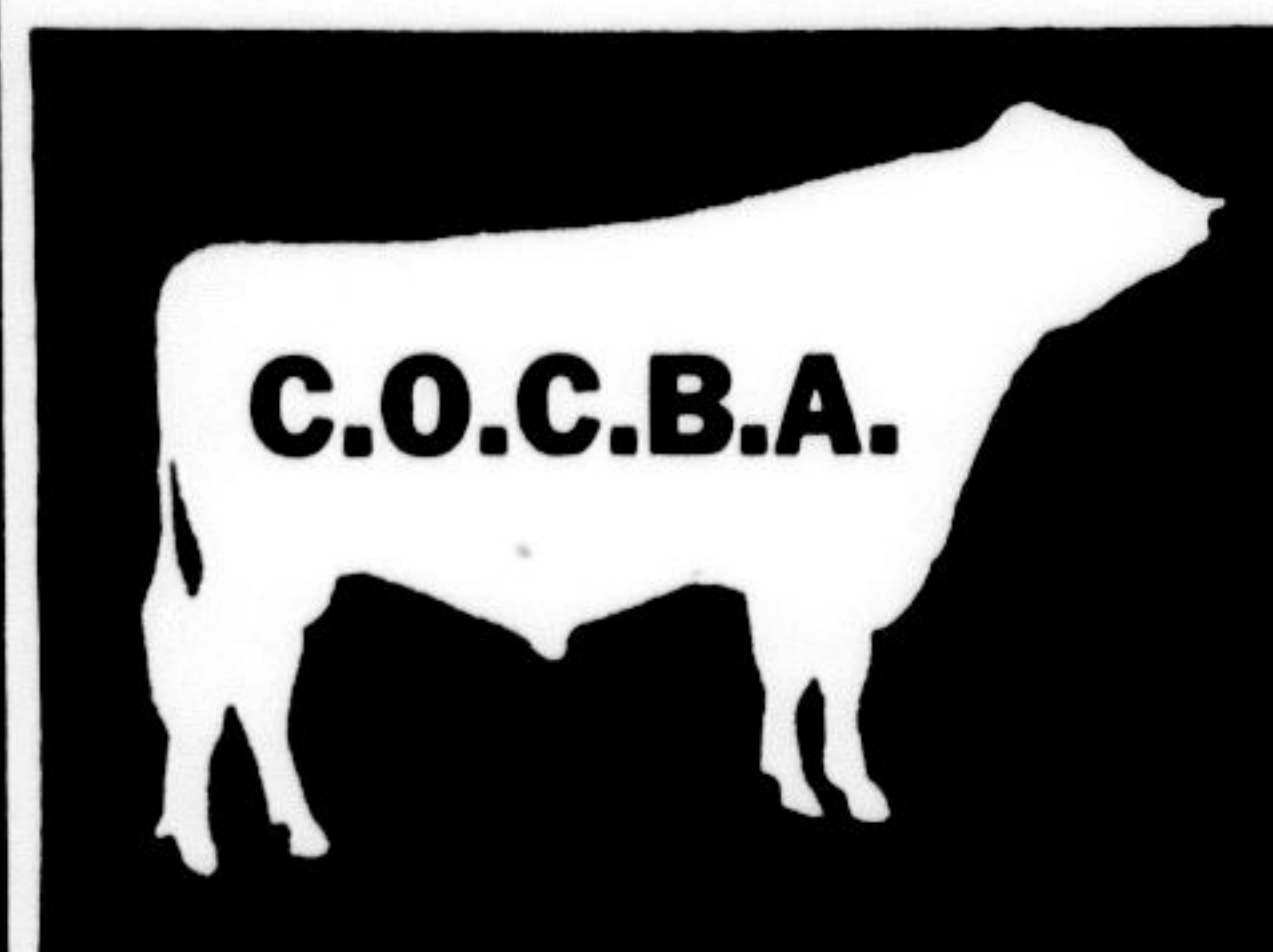

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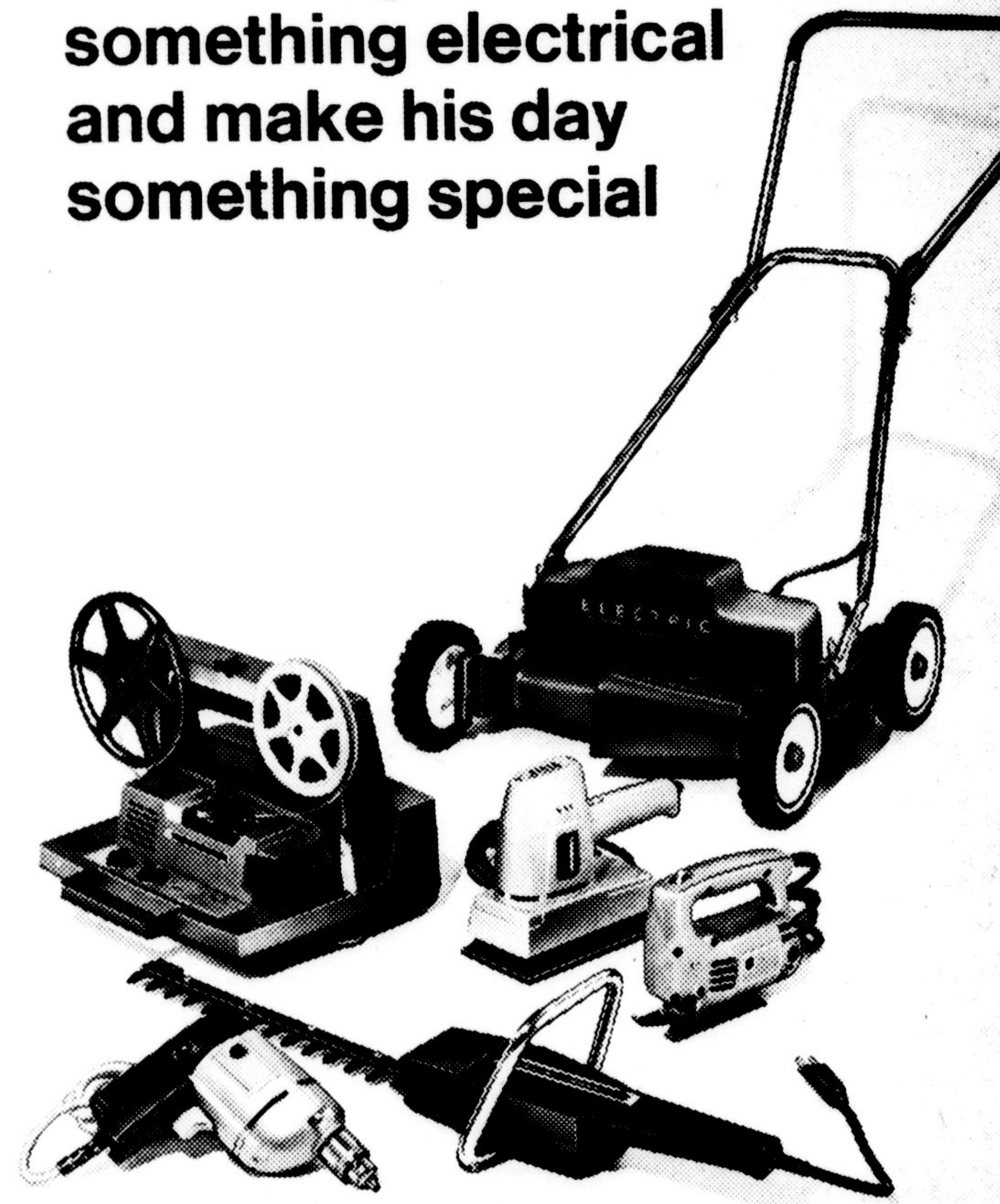


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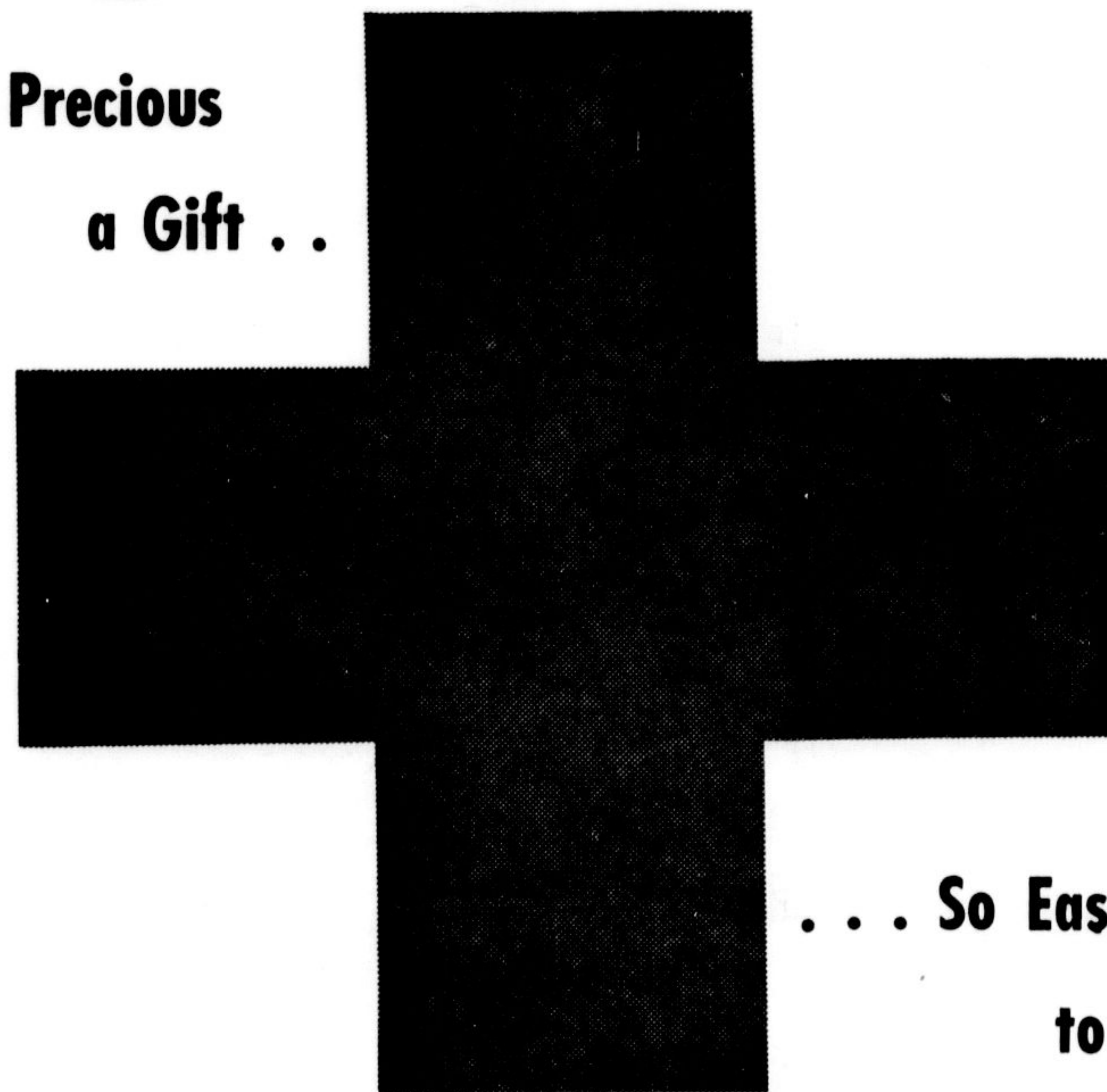
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
