The sponsoring means new hope and a chance in life for the child, who otherwise ap-

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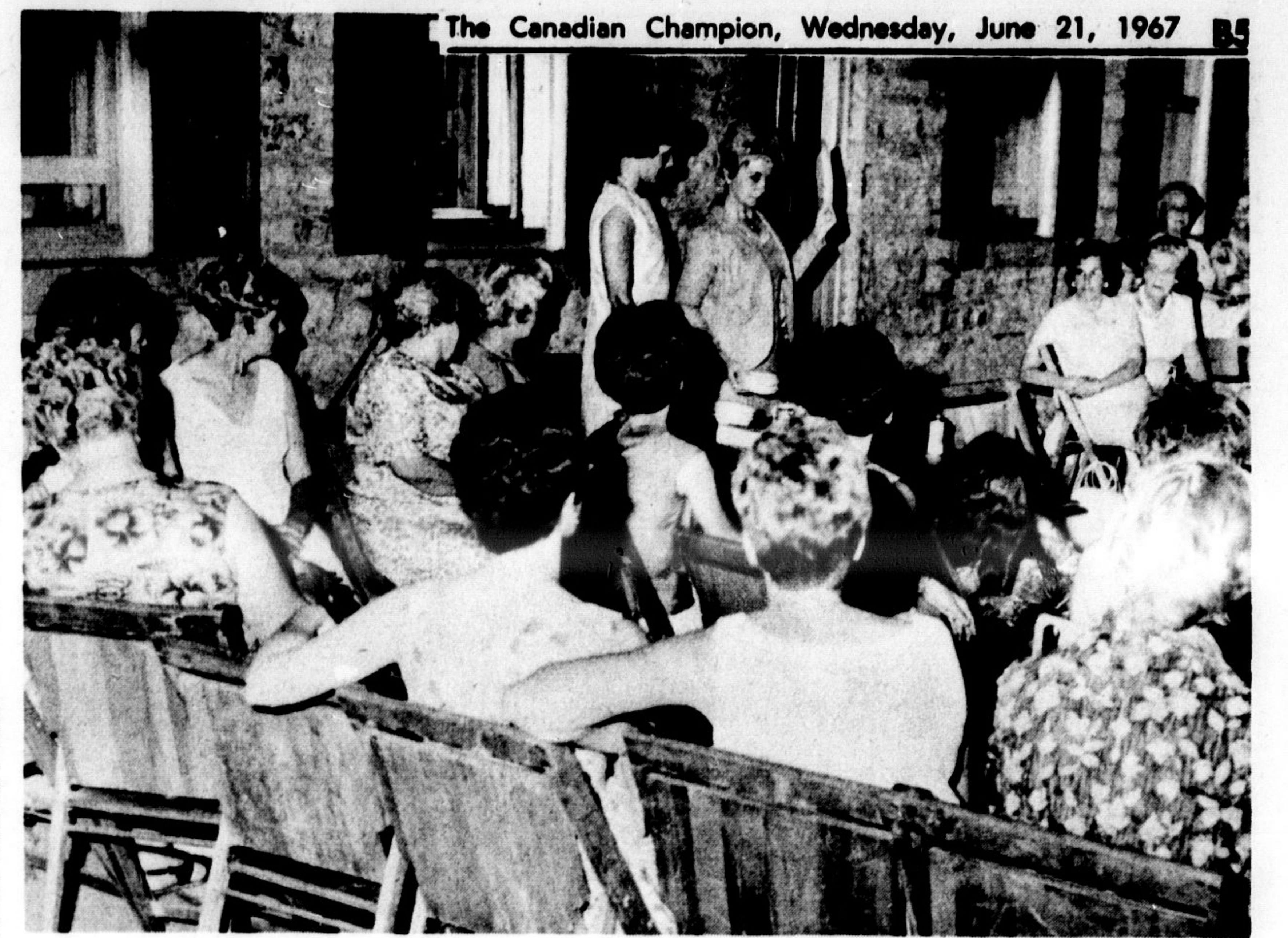
WONG YIN SHEUNG Adopted by I.O.D.E.

The question arising from the topic for study "The church today and tomorrow" was what is the position of the church today — with the souls of our young people struggling between Christianity and materialism, the lonely and depressed, the aged, many of whom feel unneeded and neglected by their families, and of course, the very high percentage of tongues other than the two

most familiar to us (French and English) from the many streams of humanity which are flowing into the river of Canada's peculiar destiny.

According to Paul in the above text, the answer is in a "one world relationship", a joining and knitting together of all Christians, of all denominations, of all churches (as the Body of Christ) in the unity of the Spirit, in the bond of peace; and from this, there must be a unity of action for an ultimate unity of Communion.

Mrs. A. Peddie read an interesting account from the Glad Tidings of the change taking place, both in individuals and in the over-all missionary picture, mentioning God's intention in both the Old and New Testaments that His world be all one, she read John 10: 16 — "I have other sheep, that are not of this fold; I must bring them also. These shall be one flock, one Shepherd."

Mrs. W. Bell offered prayer and the meeting adjourned with the hymn "Zion's King shall reign victorious" and the Lord's Prayer in unison. A pleasant time was enjoyed by all over light refreshments.

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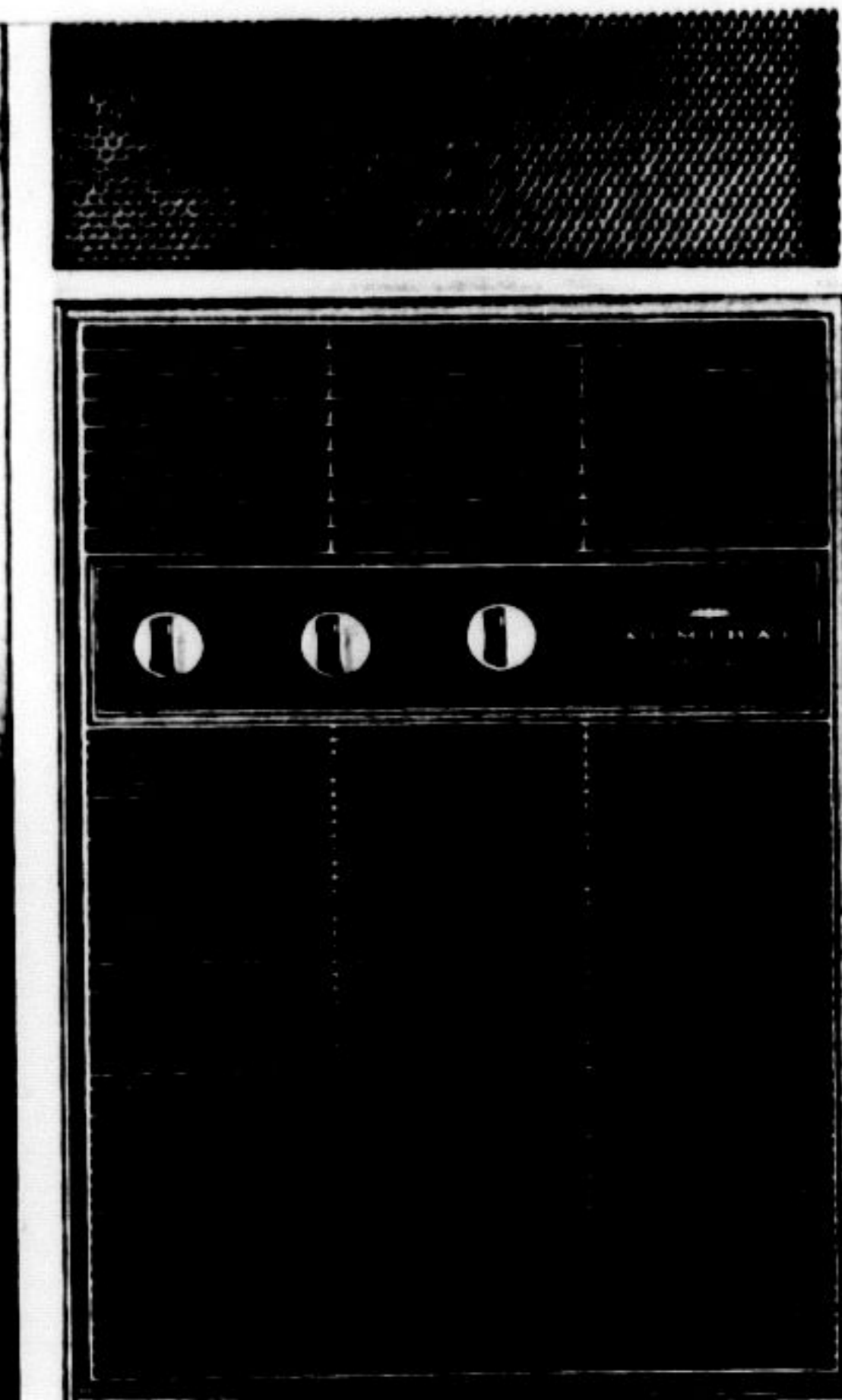
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
