Child drowns near Norval

Halton's fourth drowning tragedy struck Sun-day when a 17-month-old boy wandered into the rushing Credit River at Norval Sunday and lost his life as the swift current quickly carried him downstream.

Dead is Thomas Marcel Robitaille, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jean-Guy Robitaillie who live in a trailer at Willow Park on Highway 7 at the west end of the village.

Milton O.P.P. said the boy's mother sent him outside to see his father, who was sitting at the front of the trailer. He apparenty walked 34 feet back from the trailer to the river. It was half an hour later when the parents realized he was missing and police and Georgetown Fire Department were called. The firemen found the body half a mile downstream

Const. J. Feldcamp said the water is only a few feet deep near the trailer, but cascades swiftly to a deep pool a few yards away.

Resuscitation failed to revive the child and he was pronounced dead on arrival at the Georgetown hospital.
