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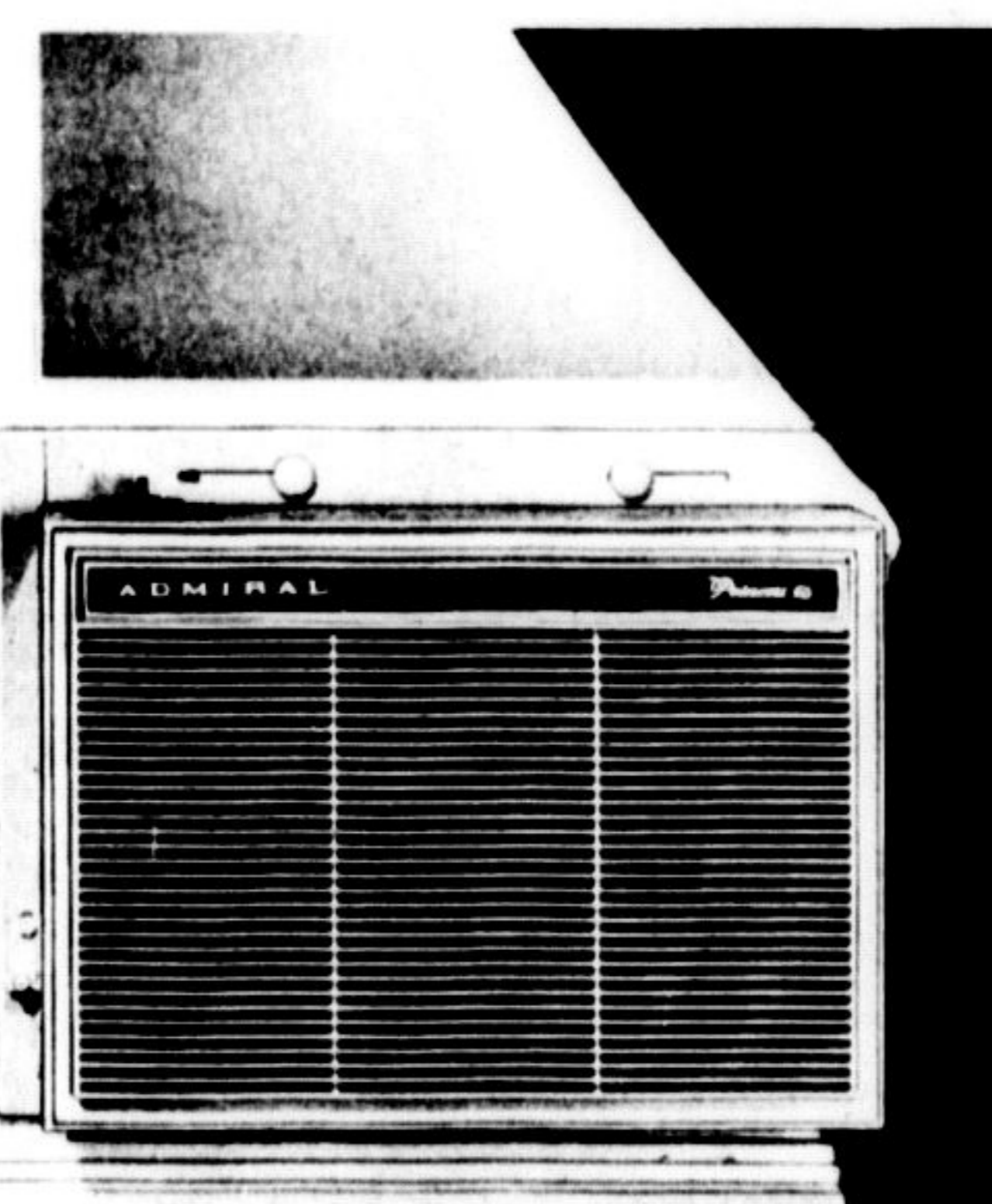
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Reproduced here is an exact copy of "The Canadian Champion and County of Halton Intelligencer" (as it was known in those days) dated July 4, 1867.
