of some of the existing buildings, the solicitor suggested. "This is not a minor variance, but allows the plant to expand to twice the size it is now."
In defence, Robin Hood manager J. C. Pettigrew explained "our reason for submitting an overall plan to the Committee of Adjustment was that it was preferable not to make any approaches on a piecemeal program."

The company faced "unreasonable hardships" at the present time, and the extension was termed "imperative" to the firm's future success in Milton. Some old buildings had been removed since the firm purchased the mill, and the large original five-storey mill had burned down in 1963, so by 1975 the firm would not be covering any more ground than it did at the time of purchase in 1960, he explained.

Mr. Pettigrew emphasized the mill's eight-year program was one of improvement as well as expansion. The firm has taken steps to abate the noise, the dust removal has been improved and further improvements are planned, he said.
"We think our facilities now are less objectionable than they were in 1960 when it was purchased," he summed up.
