

Sox break jinx, beat Tigers shutout by Hamilton Monday

After encountering almost every imaginable obstacle blocking the path to victory, Milton Red Sox broke the jinx and came through with a 6-5 win in a ten inning contest at Waterdown Sunday. The Sox returned home the following night and for the first five looked like the same ball team that had beaten Waterdown the day before. They held the Hamilton club scoreless for five innings but gave up two runs in the sixth and one in the seventh and were blanked 3-0.

Sox wasted no time in jumping on Waterdown hurler Cox, picking up three runs in their first bat on four consecutive singles, a base on balls and an error. Ronnie Shannon, who singled four times in five trips to the plate, started

things off with a single and Bill Currie, Ron Phillips and Al Jordan all followed suit. McCutcheon walked and Brian Stover got on through an error to the shortstop. Shannon, Currie and Jordan scored the runs.

Hamilton scored two runs in the second stanza on three consecutive errors. Naylor struck all three men out in that inning.

Shannon singled and scored in the third inning putting Milton ahead by a 4-2 margin.

Naylor gave up his first hit of the game in the seventh to Phillips. Phillips advanced to second on a sacrifice ball.

Ronnie Phillips put the Sox ahead 5-3 after doubling in the eighth inning.

Waterdown tied a game in the last half of the ninth inning. Scanlon pitched one down the third base line through Brian Stov's legs. Scanlon scored on Phillips' triple and Phillips scored on Henwood's single.

Shannon, the first batter to face the Waterdown pitcher in the 10th inning, singled for the fourth time in the afternoon, and moved to second on Currie's walk. The next two batters went down in succession and McCutcheon hammered a big single to drive Shannon in for the game winner.

Larry King drove a hot down the third base line and Stover scooped it out of the dirt for the third and final out. Hurler Ronnie Naylor pitched the Sox with 14 strike-out-allowed four hits and issued no walks for five runs in 10-innings of ball.

Cox started for the Tigers and was relieved by fast-batter Neil Dodman. Dodman was taken out after two innings with a sore arm and was relieved by Clark.

Coach Art Melanson had to juggle his infield here Monday against Hamilton to field a team when only nine showed up on time. The starting lineup saw Naylor at first, Shannon at second, Phillips at short and Red Currie at third.

Both teams played scoreless ball until the sixth inning when the Rebels broke the ice, picking up two runs in the sixth and one in the seventh for the 3-0 shut-out.

Sharpe tripled for Hamilton in the sixth and scored on Beaudoin's single. Hutton got on through a fielder's choice when Shannon threw to Dance, Olesciuk doubled, driving Hutton to third. Hutton scored on a wild pitch.

Bill Currie and Ron Phillips singled to account for the only Milton hits.
