### Less women drivers in accidents Friday-Saturday days to watch

Milton Police Chief Ray Andress reports a total of \$2,335 property damage was caused in 15 accidents in Milton during June.

No injuries were reported, but five of the accidents caused over \$100 damage.

Research by the department turned up the following facts:

- The majority of accidents occurred between 10 p.m. and 11 p.m. and Friday and Saturday accounted for almost 50 per cent of the crashes.
- Drivers with five years driving experience or less were involved in eight of the 15 incidents, and eight was also the total for Milton drivers involved in collisions in their hometown.

Milton area ladies will be pleased to learn that while five women drivers were involved, 13 men were at the wheels of cars involved in accidents.

Police also investigated 294 complaints, discovered 21 insecure properties and issued 83 warnings for traffic and other offenses.

The total accidents for 1967 is 101, comparing unfavorably with last year's semi-annual total of 94. Damage estimated at \$20,715 has been caused, however, less than 1966's mid-year total of \$21,690.

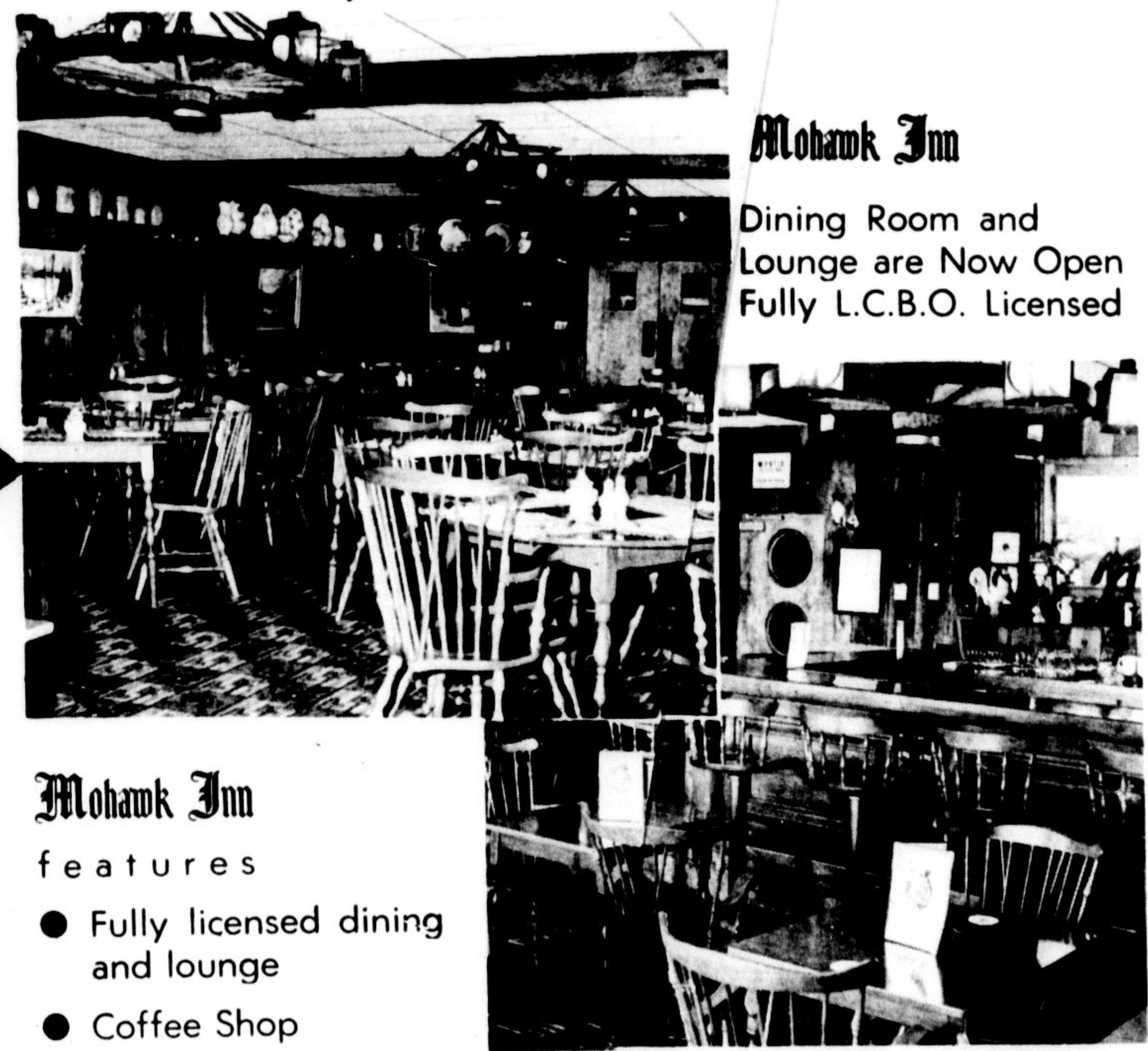
