Sunfare lures, popping plugs and deep running lures take their toll of bass in hot weather. In weedy and shallow water, live minnows are most effective.

My wife and I took a trip to Due to the heavy wind at Parry Sound last week, spending the weekend with Tom and we travelled across three lakes to get to a place called Clear Lake, where we caught eight large northern pike.

They were all caught on light spinning gear with a Red Devil spoon for bait. This is a beautiful lake and really in the wilderness, but it is well worth the trip and the two portages you have to make to get there.

For those who are planning a holiday fishing trip this summer, don't overlook Algonquin Park. The cold lakes of the parks are suited for trout. Some of the lakes are accessible only by canoes or small boat, so the fishing pressure is not great.

Lake trout up to four pounds can be caught in Lake of Two Rivers, Source, Cache, Canoe and Kesney. Smoke and Opeango have produced lakers up to 20 lbs. this summer but that

The small lake trout (4 lbs.) are the best eating, having a much finer grain. A permit is a must for Algonquin Park but costs only \$3.25 per season. Get a map of the park before you go and be prepared
