GEORGETOWN

At the conclusion of a council meeting, reeve William F. Hunter handed Mayor Gibbons two cheques he had received for committee meeting fees. "I voted against a committee meeting fee and I don't want to accept any payments," the reeve said. "I would like to see this money turned over to the recreation committee." The reeve is the second municipal official to refuse to accept payments. Mayor Gibbons had declined to accept his \$2,500 yearly fee during his tenure of office as mayor.

Halton Region Conservation Authority will file expropriation plans against eight owners of 150 acres near Georgetown — the first step toward a \$600,000 dam on the middle branch of the Sixteen Mile Creek. The 45 foot dam is designed to provide continuous stream flow throughout the summer months. It would back up the middle branch of the creek into an artificial lake a mile long and 60 feet wide. David Mallory, conservation file officer, said the expropriation plans are a formality which will make land negotiations more uniform.

Georgetown District High School Board passed a resolution at a meeting to seek the approval of Town of Geor-

etown and Township of Esquew for issuing of a \$50,000 debenture to create a proper playing field, purchase additional school property and complete the financing of the most recent addition to the school.

The University of Guelph development fund has passed the two-thirds milestone on its way to a goal of \$7,500,000. The campaign total reached \$5,000,000 in early April, co-chairman Albert A. Thornbrough, president of Massey-Ferguson Ltd., and Ronald S. Ritchie, a director of Imperial Oil Ltd., revealed. "All our volunteer workers throughout Ontario and the rest of Canada can be proud of the progress of the campaign," Mr. Thornbrough stated. "While the hard part of the campaign is now in progress, the enthusiasm of our volunteers will see that we go over the top."
