Finally just after the war's end in 1945, the accumulated sawing of untold hundreds of students who were not medalists or born musicians brought her to the decision to take a break from violin instruction and teach piano, a subject she was familiar with through studying the accompaniments to violin selections.

Her demands for near-perfection will be remembered by budding Milton pianists throughout their lives.

The story is told of a situation, not in Milton, but typical. Two students waiting for lessons in an ante-room were met by the preceeding pupil, in tears, and obviously depressed and vengeful.

"You should be glad," they told him. "Wish she'd make us cry. It means you're likely to get first class honors on the ex-

He did. For two years she was organist at Grace Anglican Church, Milton, and while still living in Milton she went to Hamilton to play first violin in the Hamilton Opera Company until she

required a hip operation. When it was found she was carrying out her intentions to quit teaching piano at 70, Kingston Symphony Orchestra asked her to return to her birthplace to play first violin with them.

Also, she has been asked to accept a few advanced violin students, but hasn't yet made a final decision.
