**Centennial cairn for Erin township**

Rain delayed the official dedication of a memorial pylon near Erin a week ago.

The dedication was to have been made in the afternoon by Judge C. L. Austen. A church service was held later in the evening.

The cairn was erected by the township of Erin at a new park, Centennial Park, located on Highway 24, about one mile east of Erin in "permanent commemoration of the Centennial of Confederation."

A plaque on the cairn gives a history of the township showing it was first surveyed in 1819-1820. The settlers arrived around 1820 with the first Erin council named in 1842.

The township was formed under the district of Wellington County in 1854.

Centennial Park and the cairn is located on property purchased from the Ontario department of highways on a former school grounds.

**TOWN OF BURLINGTON Notice to Realty Taxpayers**

The council of the Town of Burlington has authorized the establishment of a system of municipal and school tax credits and refunds under the provisions of The Municipal and School Tax Credit Assistance Act, 1967, to assist elderly persons. A tax credit equivalent to one-half of the municipal and school taxes may be allowed in respect of a real property, subject to a maximum of \$150, if:

- (a) the owner, and/or the husband or the wife of the owner, is 65 years of age or more and occupies the real property as a personal residence,
- (b) application is made by the taxpayer during the calendar year in which the realty taxes, in respect of which the tax credit is claimed, become due and payable, and
- (c) the remaining portion of the realty taxes, after the deduction of the tax credit, has been paid.

Full particulars of the system of tax credits and an application form may be obtained from the office of the municipal treasurer at 426 Brant Street, Burlington, Ontario. Applicants should supply documents of title showing legal description of property or the registration number of the deed on which application for credit is being made.
