Rick Roberts threw a two-hitter for the Giants in the first three innings while relief Laurence Cargill allowed three hits in the remainder of the game.

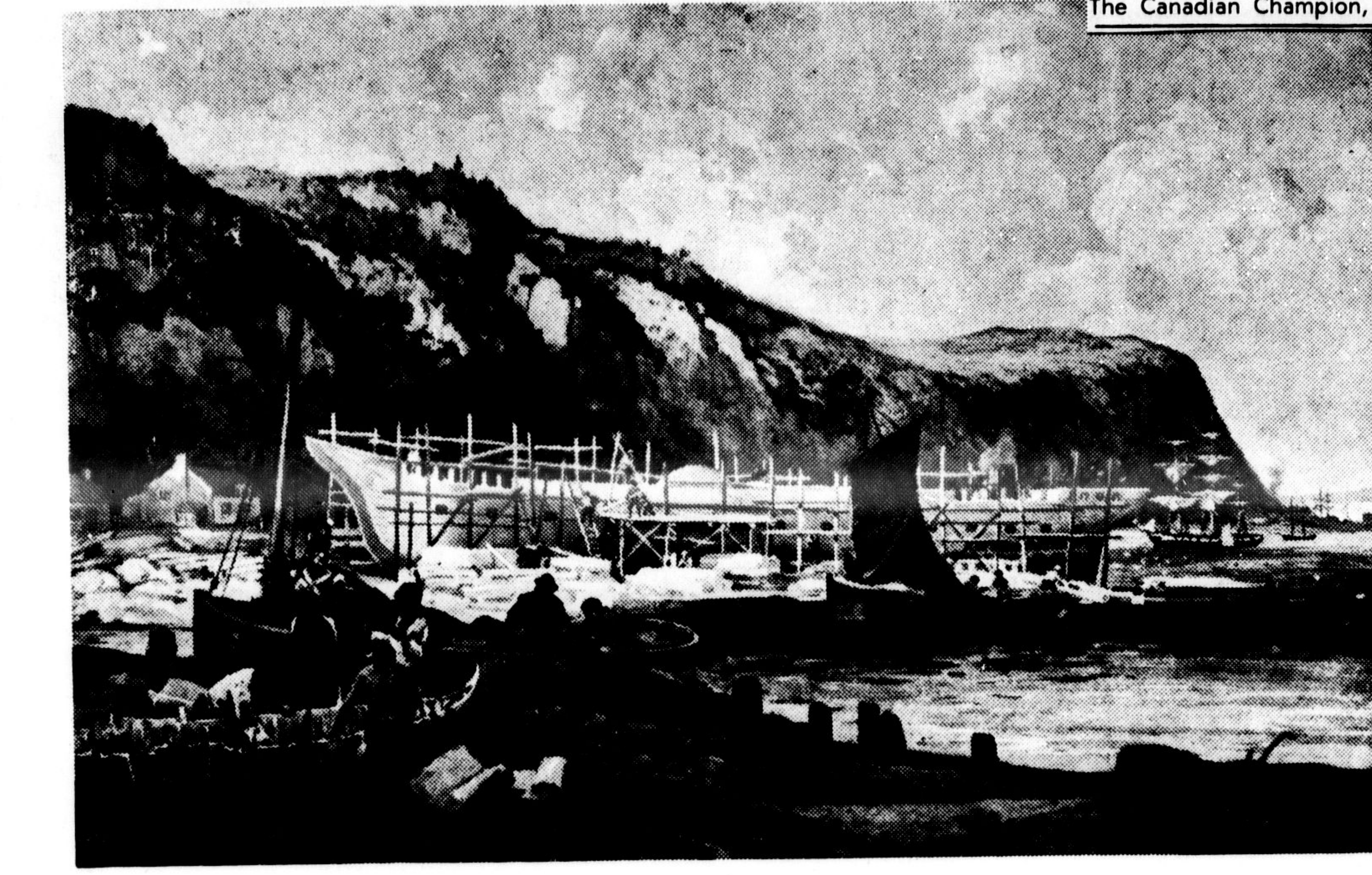
Nyholt led the Mets attack with a double and a single while singles went to Wills, Nadalin and Arnold. L. Charlton was the loser.

THE ROYAL WILLIAM AT SEA

Canada's Royal William was launched at or near Wolfe's Cove, Quebec, by Lady Aylmer, wife of the then Governor-General of the Canada, and was named after His Majesty William IV, "The Sailor King". She was built by the Quebec and Halifax Steam Navigation Company, and among the stockholders of this Company were Samuel Cunard and Joseph Cunard, of Halifax, who subsequently established the famous Cunard Line, which has provided so many vessels to which the title "Queen of the Atlantic" has been applied. The "Royal William" made several successful trips between Quebec and Halifax, also a trip to Boston, Massachusetts, and, on August 17, 1833, she left Pictou, Nova Scotia, for England, under the command of Captain John McDougall, with a crew of 36 men. She made Gravesend in 25 days, using steam all the way, establishing the first claim to be the first ship to cross the Atlantic from Canada to England by steam-power. She was sold in London, chartered by the Portuguese as a steam transport and, in 1834, was bought by the Spanish Government for use in war, being the first steam warship. (Painted by J. D.
