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

The 1967-68 term enrolment is an additional 55 students over last year's total of 395. The staff this year will total 295 full time plus several supply staffers and part time emplovees, superintendent D. E. Kennedy reports.

O.S.D. was designed to accommodate 500 junior and senior students, but facilities are becoming taxed already. The school expects a larger enrolment in the junior school than the facilities can handle — so some juniors will be living in senior residence and some will be attending class in the senior school complex.

The school will operate 27 classes for juniors this year, an increase of two over last vear. Among the juniors are 45 beginners, five and six year olds who are just starting life in the school.

Boundaries of the area covered by the school have changed this year. Until now, O.S.D. Milton handled all students living west of Highway 400, while anyone living east of this dividing line attended the Belleville school. But on September the counties of York and Simcoe (excluding Metro Toronto) have been added to the Milton area. Mr. Kennedy said it initially means an addition of 15 or 20 children — some who will transfer from Belleville and some beginners.

The Department of Education now has plans for a third school for the deaf, somewhere in the province. A site has not vet been announced.

O.S.D.'s vocational program for senior students has been expanded this year, with the ddition of a second commercial subjects teacher, a second librarian, an extra boys' occupations teacher, additional home economics and industrial arts teachers, and the opening up of the cabinet making shop. 


