## Sports personality named to sports hall of fame

By Bob Burtt Proficiency in any field often runs within a family from one generation to the next. So seems to be the case of promin-

ent Milton sports figure Art (Sammy) Melanson. Art's father was active in baseball from the time he was old enough to find his own way to the diamond until his death in September of 1951. But he was just recently acknowledged for his contribution to the sport when he was named to the Nova Scotia Sports Hall of Fame.

The elder of the diamond personalities played his first organized ball in Inverness and later played for Glace Bay and

As J. E. "Gee" Ahern, president of the Nova Scotia Sports Hall of Fame puts it, Sammy was a man with spirit and ambition and he was always anxious to pass it along to younger

He coached the Dominion Hawks in the Cape Breton Pro League and after several years with the senior team Sammy coached the Junior Hawks.

Art still recalls his father's last performance as a ball player. "I was a bat boy then and my father was the manager. We were shorthanded so he stepped in and had two hits and a walk in three times at bat and we won that game," Art said. Sam senior was 51 years old at that time.

Foozy Scatalon, Fred Leaver and Art all played on teams coached by the elder Melanson in Nova Scotia. All three left Nova Scotia together, split up on their arrival in Ontario and came together later here in Milton to play Intermediate hockey.

Art spent his first winter travelling from his home in Toronto to Milton to play hockey. The following season he moved to Milton where he worked in a brick yard for a year before going to work at Knight's Men's Wear, where has has been employed ever since. Leaver moved from Brantford to Milton and still lives in the area.

Perhaps Foozy would be best remembered because of his ability and color on ice. He played part of a season in Springfield with Eddie Shore's Indians but never completed the season. Art has been part of the Milton Intermediate baseball

team since his arrival in Milton in 1946. He coached the team to a championship in 1949 and 1959 and stepped in as coach when Dick Clement stepped down early this season. He also played hockey until the intermediate team folded in favor of a junior entry three years ago.

As far as coaching next year goes, the Nova Scotian native has said he plans to decline but there is a long winter ahead and a lot of time for him to change his mind.

The same willingness to help ball players and young hockey players that "Gee" Ahern speaks of when the name Melanson comes up, is evident with Art or Sammy junior.
