O.P.P. investigating fraud, theft cases

During the week of Sept. 10 to 16 inclusive, personnel of Milton Detachment Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 793 1/4 hours and patrolled 6,759 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 64 traffic charges were preferred, 54 traffic warnings were issued, and 50 vehicles were safety checked. There were 69 convictions registered in Magistrate's Court during this period.

There were 10 property damage accidents investigated and five personal injury accidents, resulting in six persons being injured and total property damage of approximately \$6,365. Causes of accidents were inattentive driving, following too closely, driver lost control of vehicle, and cutting in. There

were nine charges laid as a result of these accidents.

Thirty-eight general occurrences were reported during this period, including two break, enter and thefts in Esquesing Twp., two fraud investigations resulting in one person being arrested and charged, one missing juvenile located and returned home, one person arrested for Metro Toronto Police Dept., three minor thefts being investigated, and three premises found insecure at night. Other occurrences were of a minor nature.

As construction has begun on Highway 25 north of 401 Hwy., construction zone speeds are being posted. These posted speed limits shall be strictly enforced, according to C. J. Parkinson, sergeant.

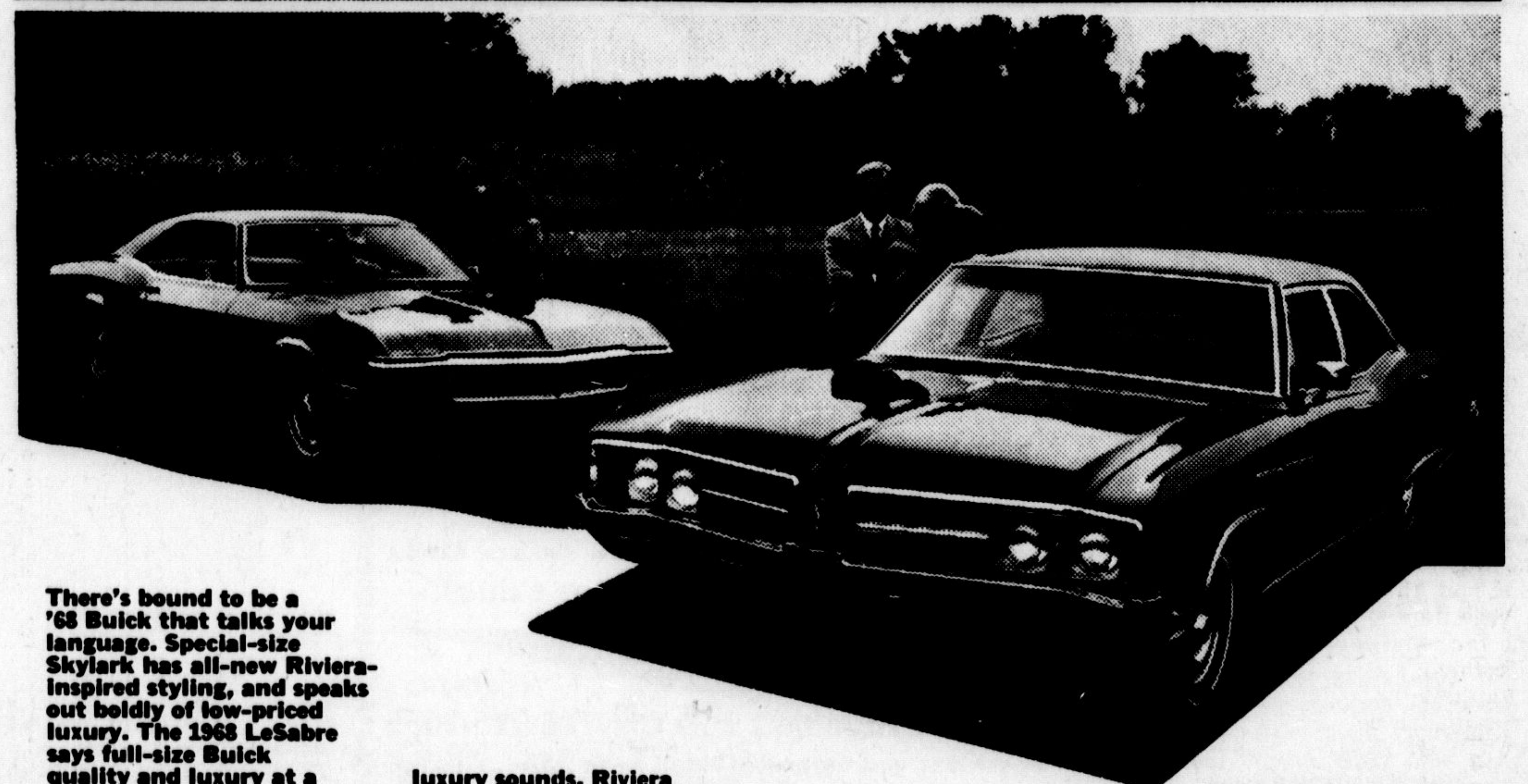
