that the RCAF is well qualified

air really weakens a fellow . . .

ered round the hearth in the

(Ont.) paper mill is a good

direction when a lively discus-  
sion was held over a new home  
for the aged.  
Warden William Coulter, Nas-  
sagaweya's Reeve, warned the  
councillors a more equal sys-  
tem of assessing would have to  
be adopted before the county  
could progress in many other  
fields. Welfare, education, plan-  
ning and assessment would be  
at a standstill until the entire  
county adopted a uniform sys-  
tem of assessing properties, he  
said.

The vote was finally called.  
Oakville and Burlington rep-  
resentatives and Deputy Reeve  
George Currie of Esquimes fa-  
vored the motion calling for  
the county to reject the  
scheme. The opposition was re-  
gistered by Acton, Georgetown  
and Milton's delegates, Warden  
Coulter and Esquimes Reeve  
George Leslie, all of whom said  
they favored immediate adop-  
tion of the system.
