

New driver education course starts soon at high school

A driver education course for students of Milton District High School will be underway in the near future, with teacher K. J. Black of the school staff handling the instruction.

The course will be given to students after school hours, using a classroom provided by the school board and an instruction car fitted with dual controls. The cost to students will be \$20.

Each student taking the course will be required to put in 25 hours in the classroom plus six hours behind the wheel of the car, and 18 hours in the car as an observer while another student drives.

Mr. Black attended a special course sponsored by the Ontario Safety League in Toronto this summer to prepare himself to instruct the course. He was one of 192 high school teachers who qualified for a certificate at the end of the two week course. Promotion of the life-saving course is carried on the Ontario Department of Transport, Highway Safety Branch, and the course is being taught in 265 Ontario schools.

The course has been approved in principle by the Milton District High School Board. The board expects the cost per student will be approximately \$40 and is prepared to underwrite half the cost.

As in other schools, graduates of the course will be eligible for a 10 per cent reduction

in insurance rates until they reach the age of 25 years. This saving in premiums has been estimated at up to \$1,000.






