The numerous small animals seen dead along the highways should remind all drivers that large animals can and do cause many serious accidents, Milton OPP Sgt. C. J. Parkinson noted in a weekly press release Monday.

This fact was most evident as this week one of the accidents involved a deer and resulted in one person being injured and approximately \$1,000 damage to the vehicle.

During the first six months of this year, there were 508 accidents involving animals, with deer causing twice as many as any other species within the province.
