Hornby hunters bag two moose

A trio of local moose hunters did well at Larder Lake last week, but like fishermen, they missed the proverbial "big one that got away."

Gord Lee and his son Grant from Hornby and Bob Pressick from Milton were hunting with two northern residents near Larder Lake, and Grant and Bob each shot a year-old bull moose. One weighed 460 pounds and the other was 425 pounds — nice eating size but still a chore to quarter and carry three miles through the dense bush to their camp.

One morning another hunter in their party, Frank Satcher of Virginiatown, saw a moose rack some distance away, watched the horns for a while and finally got off one shot. The shot produced several handfuls of moose hair, but no moose and not a drop of blood. Mr. Satcher claimed the antlers were bigger than a 62 inch set he had a couple of years

ago, and the party spent the rest of the week unsuccessfully looking for the "big one."

The hunters report the weather was pretty warm and one day it hit 75 degrees. Gord Lee came home with the two young bulls a few days early because the meat would have spoiled if left to hang in the warm air much longer.

The horns off both moose are being preserved. Each animal was felled with one shot.

Food, fun, music and politics will highlight the evening. In event of rain the rally will be held in the Circus room of the Burlington Arena.

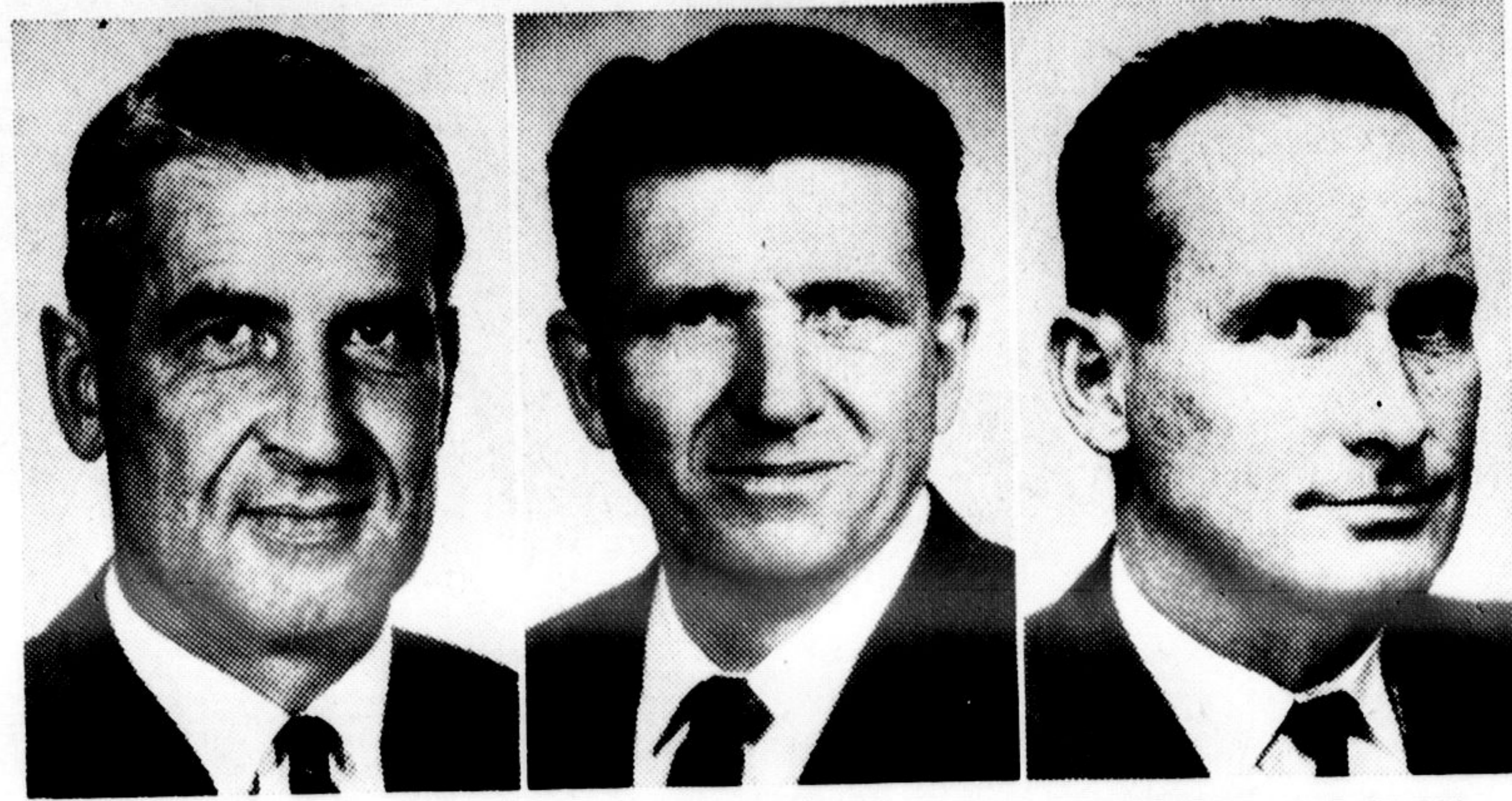
CENTENNIAL CONFERENCE
