Apparently the trio have been sent to Canada by a Japanese firm who have agreed to foot the bill for the year with the express intent of having the boys return to Japan and represent them in the 1972 Olympics. It is also rumored this same firm has pledged 150,000 for the three boys' expenses.

Although no decision has been made about keeping David Turner, Bruce Ellison, Tom on the squad, he has met with the approval of many fans and several executive members.



-Those same taces that showed up faithfully to coach ball during the long, hot summer are popping up at the arena, preparing for a long, cold winter of hockey.


