The board felt it fitting that a resident, himself older than confederation, should participate in the ceremony to open the building during Canada's

centennial year. Scheduled to speak during the official opening ceremony are Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton who is the 1967 chairman of the Manor's board of management, Reeve Gordon Gallagher of Burlington, Halton M.P.P. George A. Kerr, Halton's federal M.P. Dr. Harry C. Harley and Reeve H. Merry of Oakville. The keys will be presented by J. Richards, general contractor to architect Donald E. Skinner and in turn to Reeve Gallagher.

Martin House is Halton's second home for the aged. The first which opened in 1952 is known as Pettit House, in memory of the late Mrs. Mary Pettit who served as a Milton and Halton councillor for several years.

Completion of the new home, adjacent to the Pettit House on Ontario St. S. in Milton, was a controversial issue. Several construction strikes held up its progress and it was a year late in opening when the first residents moved in on April 18 of this year.
