## May cut your elm tree yet

### Third theft nets \$1,000

Thieves again struck at the P. L. Robertson Manufacturing Co. on Bronte St. Sunday evening, making off with about \$1,000 worth of cambium-coated balls, similar to those taken in two previous break-and-entries.

The theft was discovered by a night watchman at the plant and police are continuing their investigation.

Plating materials valued at \$4,000 have disappeared from the industry in the past six weeks. The company has offered a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest of the intruders.

The possibility of a co-operative winter works program for cleaning out diseased elm trees on both town and private property was debated by Milton Council on Monday. The Department of Manpower and Immigration manager Miss E. L. Hartwell suggested in a letter to council that the removal of dead elms would be an ideal winter works incentive program. Grants of 75 per cent are available on labor costs, if those employed are people who are out of work.

Some councillors felt it would still be costly to the town to pay even 25 per cent of the removal costs, because many of the local dead elms are on town property. But councillor Brian Best said the town should seize the opportunity to have the government pay three-quarters of the expense while it's available.

"We don't seem to take advantage of enough government grants," he charged, blaming lack of foresight by some council committees.

Town works superintendent Bruce McKerr was away on a hunting trip when the topic came up for discussion. Members agreed to await his return and if the project meets with his approval, he will be asked to do a survey on the number of dead trees on town property and take a guess at the costs.

At the same time, council may order the removal crews to take down trees on private property. If the town can get assurance of grants for the privately-owned trees it would cost the owners just 25 per cent of the cost.

It was suggested a notice in the paper would soon tell council how many dead trees there are on private property.

## St. John asks funds: 2,360 hours of duty in past nine months

The local St. John Ambulance division is conducting its second annual campaign for funds in Milton and district next week, branch committee chairman Al Thompson announced today.

The week of November 13 to 18 has been proclaimed "St. John Ambulance Week in Milton" and besides the financial campaign, the brigade is attempting to acquaint Miltonians with their work and the services available.

Mr. Thompson said last year's campaign brought in \$1,200 which was certainly gratifying. This year the objective is \$1,500. The main drive for funds will be Monday evening but about 60 canvassers will continue their work throughout next week until every home has been reached.

Saturday, local Cubs will distribute information about the brigade to every home in town. The publicity includes an annual report and a handy home chart on first aid.

Brigade superintendent Don Miller notes that since January of 1967, the members of Milton Division No. 488 have assisted at the following events: the search in Kilbride, the Golden Centennial Air Show, the Nassagaweya Centennial celebrations, the opening of the mill pond, the Centennial Caravan, the Girl Guide rally, the Rover Moot, the Firemen's Centennial parade, Hidden Valley park, the German Canadian club Hofbrauhaus, the Steam-Era, the Fall Fair, the local talent show, as well as roller skating and hockey at the local arena — totalling 2,360 hours of duty and treating over 100 injuries up to the end of October.

The training committee has taught over 150 local people in first aid and home nursing in

the past year, Mr. Miller noted.

Dan Pegg is secretary-treasurer of the campaign and reports canvassers will be making their returns to him at the St. John House on Martin St.

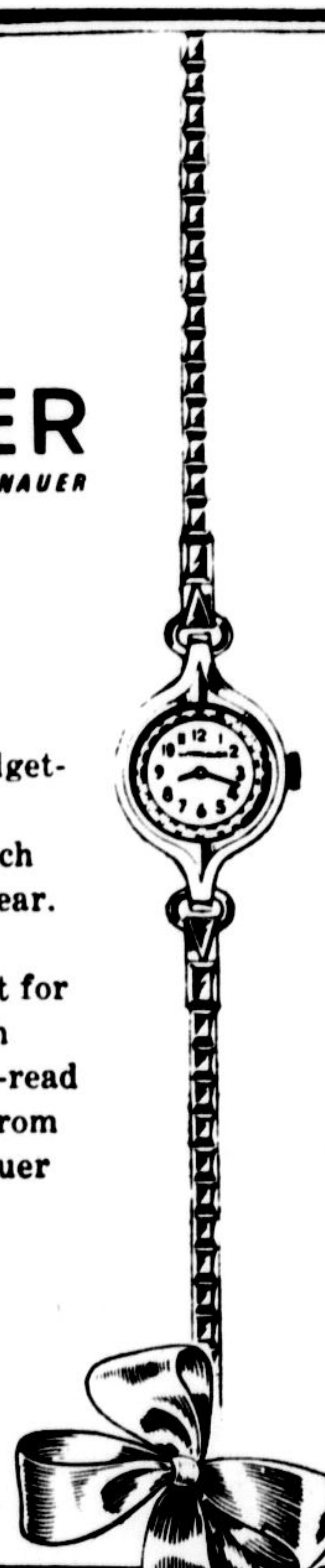
