In one instance we were asking permission to shoot ducks and the rancher took us to a section of land across the road and showed us where some hunters, just the day before, had cut four strands of barbed wire with wire cutters, 100 yards from a gate and let out a prize herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle. Then we wonder why we cannot hunt on certain properties and why more and more land is being posted every year. Fellow sportsmen, will you please ask permission to hunt this year?

While we are one the subject of damage done by hunters, Ontario Hydro has a problem also. When a misguided moose mows down a hydro pole the resulting power stoppage is unavoidable, and when a beaver miscalculates and fells a tree across transmission lines, or porcupine eat through insulation, hydro employees are likely to shrug it off as part of caused by hunters.
