The hunting season is in full swing again, and as every year, the age-old question comes up. Should we allow hunting here in the Southern part of Ontario or not? Already word has been coming in from our neighbors to the south about hunters causing damage to property. Some of these complaints are with good cause, and some are strictly hearsay.

Your writer tried to track down some complaints he heard last year about vandalism caused by hunters, and found out most were strictly word of mouth complaints or gossip passed on from anti-hunting cranks. Some, I found out, were completely true.

Myself and Frank Gowland just returned from a duck hunting trip to Alberta and they also have the same problems out there. In one instance we were asking permission to shoot ducks and the rancher took us to a section of land across the road and showed us where some hunters, just the day before, had cut four strands of barbed wire with wire cutters, 100 yards from a gate and let out a prize herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle. Then we wonder why we cannot hunt on certain properties and why more and more land is being posted every year. Fellow sportsmen, will you please ask permission to hunt this year?

While we are one the subject of damage done by hunters, Ontario Hydro has a problem also. When a misguided moose mows down a hydro pole the resulting power stoppage is unavoidable, and when a beaver miscalculates and fells a tree across transmission lines, or porcupine eat through insulation, hydro employees are likely to shrug it off as part of their jobs. But there is one type of interruption they will never shrug off, and that is direct vandalism done to hydro insulation by hunters shooting at them. Hydro lines in Ontario last year suffered to the tune of \$30,000 damage caused by hunters. This is not

a pretty picture fellows, and I do not enjoy writing about it any more than you do reading about it.

Most moose hunters from this locality are home and from all reports, the bag of moose this year was away below average. Now at this writing the deer hunters are away and we wish them every success in their hunt.

The work on the addition to the Halton Sportsmen's club house is coming along fine thanks to a few steady, reliable from the club. This is going to improve our club facilities a lot with more floor space, rest rooms for ladies and gents and also a nice kitchen space. This all takes time, money and a lot of work. Paul Coulson has taken over his duties as President and is doing a fine job. This job entails a lot of hard work, also and a great deal of diplomacy.

Merchants trounce Orangeville club suffer suspensions in Streetsville

Streetsville Derby's flew to a 4-1 victory in their first game of the Suburban Junior C Hockey against Milton Merchants in Streetsville Tuesday night. It was the Merchants' second loss in three games.

Milton was without the services of defencemen Kevin Tuckwell, Steve Gervais and Leon Stickle as well as forwards Paul Kitchen and Don Hearn. The group sat out a one game suspension that resulted from a brawl in Georgetown the previous Sunday afternoon. Bob Lee was sidelined with an ankle injury. Lee injured his ankle before the season opened and it gave way in the first play of the game in Georgetown Sunday.

It was bound to hurt, replacing five players so early in the season, but the big problem was the Streetsville goalie, Stu Patterson. Patterson turned way 38 shots compared to 30 by Milton goalie Dale Dunning.

Perhaps the turning point of the game was late in the second period. Milton had a two man advantage and the rubber flew at the Streetsville net, over the net and on either side of the cage but the Merchants couldn't get even a flicker out of the red light. Had they beaten Patterson, then the game

may have had a different completion.

Patterson played juvenile for Brampton last year and boasts a 1.98 goal average for 40 games. The Streetsville puck-stopper robbed Milton attackers repeatedly.

Bill Perks, Dave McCallum, Fred Nasato and J. Workman were the Streetsville goal scorers. Rick Cole beat Patterson on a break-away late in the third period to spoil his shut-out.

Streetsville scored all four goals on close-in plays and Dunning had little change on any of them.

Ken Parton, Tom Gooding and Dave Gates were called up from the midgets and juveniles to replace the suspended players.

Although Milton outshot their opposition 38-30 the Derby's made their chances count. Had it not been for good goaltending at either end the score could have been considerably higher.
